Ways to improve a sentence.

The dog ate the bone

- Add describing words in: *The shaggy dog carefully ate* the old bone.
- Add words into the middle: *The dog, which was starving,* ate the bone.
- Add on at the beginning: Although it had just eaten, the dog ate the bone.
- Add on at the end: The dog ate the bone; it was hungry.
- Change words to make them more interesting: *The poodle* qnawed the bone.
- Add in a simile: The dog, like a greedy vulture, ate the bone.
- Use alliteration: The devious dog ate the delicious bone desperately.

Things to do at home

- Help your child learn their spellings.
- Create a quiet space to do homework.
- Play writing and spelling games.
- Write for real life reasons: post cards, letters, recipes etc.
- Make information booklets about interests.
- Read lots of different texts they will give lots of ideas for writing.
