Everyone under 18 has these rights.

article 2

All children have these rights, no matter who they are, where they live, what their parents do, what language they speak, what their religion is, whether they are a boy or girl, what their culture is, whether they have a disability, whether they are rich or poor. No child should be treated unfairly on any basis.

article 3

All adults should do what is

You have the right to live with your parent(s), unless it is bad for you. You have the right to live with a family who cares for you.

article 10

If you live in a different country than your parents do, you have the right to be together in the same place.

article 11

You have the right to be protected from kidnapping.

article 12

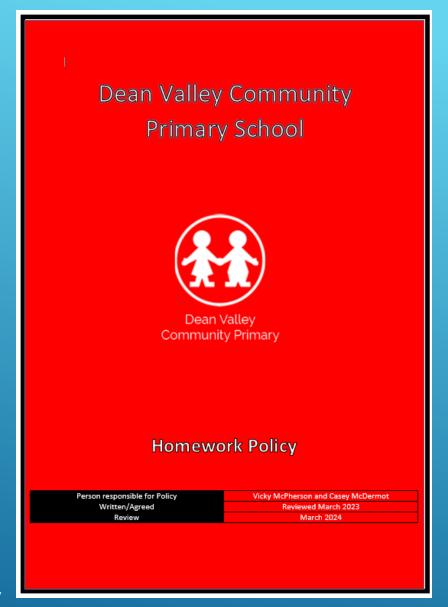

KS1, KS2 and the office will no longer be using the ClassDojo as we have now made the move to use one platform only for communication – School Spider. Lunch will be provided if forgotten and charged to parents.

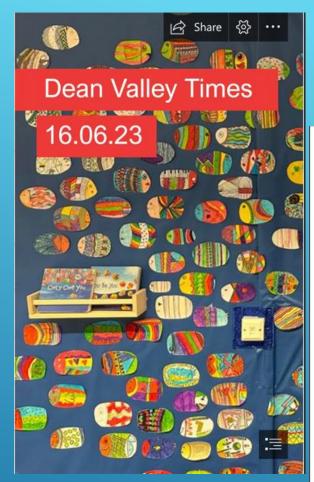
Swimming kit is available to borrow from the leisure centre.

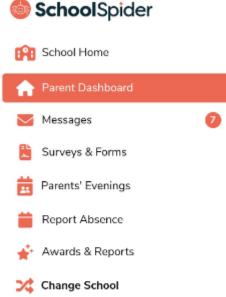
Newsletter

CURRICULUM



What will year 2023/2024 look like?



Our goal is to create lifelong learners equipped to tackle challenges in a changing world. We foster an innovative learning community to unlock our pupils' true potential.



The curriculum is designed with termly Topic drivers, connected to subjects like Geography, History, and Science. Thematic links are made to help students retain knowledge. The Planning document is saved on the class website each term.



We use White Rose for maths, building on prior knowledge with units focused on number, shape, measure, fractions, and algebra. The units progress sequentially, and we support White Rose with Numbots and TT Rockstars for number fluency. Home support is crucial.



We use Spelling Shed to support spelling learning, focusing on sound-symbol relationships and morphology (**sub***marine*). Nessy is used for additional support, and Spelling Shed aligns with the National Curriculum spellings.

Intent

. To allow children to learn about the ever changing geology of the earth

To encourage children to notice and understand that there are different types of rocks and that they are formed in different ways. To encourage children to think about their local environment in terms of its geology and climate and how this impacts on what might grow there

To understand that writing can inform as well as entertain and that the language choices we make will have an effect on the reader

To give children the tools to find information from books and on line efficiently and with confidence.

Implementation

Children will use atlases and maps to discover more about the earth's crust. Field work and handling of rocks will allow children to notice and fell the different between different kinds of rocks. This will add to knowledge found and read in books found in the classroom and the internet. A trip to a local cavern will engage the children and inspire questions about our local landscape as well as influence informative writing. Engaging with the natural environment will also influence our ingredient choices when we learn about seasonal foods.

How do we prepare our children?

Statutory tests will be administered in the following subjects:

- Reading (60 minutes)
- Spelling (approximately 15 minutes)
- Punctuation, Vocabulary and Grammar (45 minutes)
- Mathematics
 - Paper 1: Arithmetic (30 minutes)
 - Paper 2: Reasoning (40 minutes)
 - Paper 3: Reasoning (40 minutes)
- There are no tests to be administered in science this year.
- All tests are externally marked.
- As in recent years, writing will be teacher assessed internally.

- The reading test consists of a single test paper with three unrelated reading texts. Children are given 60 minutes in total, which includes reading the texts and answering the questions.
- A total of 50 marks are available.
- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- During the reading paper, a child's inference and deduction skills are thoroughly tested. They will also be expected to answer questions on authorial choices: explaining why an author has chosen to use particular vocabulary, grammar and text features.
- Some questions are multiple choice or selected response; others reasonswers and some require an extended response or explanation.

- A separate test is given on grammar, punctuation and vocabulary.
- This test lasts for 45 minutes and requires short answer questions including some multiple choice.
- Marks for these two tests are added together to give a total for grammar, punctuation and spelling.

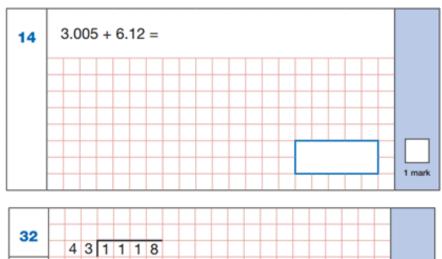

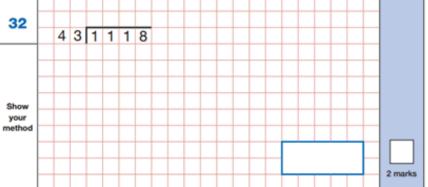
- The mathematics tests have undergone the biggest change in recent years.
- Children will sit three tests: paper 1, paper 2 and paper 3.
- Paper 1 is for arithmetic lasting for 30 minutes, covering calculation methods for all operations, including use of fractions, percentages and decimals.
- Questions gradually increase in difficulty. Not all children will be expected to access some of the more difficult questions later in the paper.
- Papers 2 and 3 cover problem solving and reasoning, each lasting for 40 minutes.
- Pupils will still require calculation skills but will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.

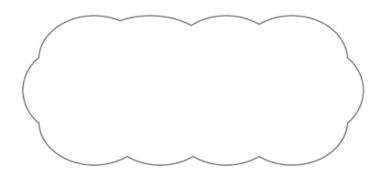

What is meant by 'scaled scores'?

- It is planned that 100 will always represent the 'national standard'.
- Each pupil's raw test score will therefore be converted into a score on the scale, either at, above or below 100.
- The scale will have a lower end point somewhere below 100 and an upper end point above 100.
- A child who achieves the 'national standard' (a score of 100) will be judged to have demonstrated sufficient knowledge in the areas assessed by the tests.

SCALED SCORES

You will receive: Test scores Scaled scores A judgement

- First and foremost, support and reassure your child that there is nothing to worry about and they should always just try their best. Praise and encourage!
- Ensure your child has the best possible attendance at school.
- Support your child with any homework tasks.
- Reading, spelling and arithmetic (e.g. times tables) are always good to practise.
- Talk to your child about what they have learnt at school and what book(s) they
 are reading (the character, the plot, their opinion).
- Make sure your child has a good sleep and healthy breakfast every morning!
