KS2 Assessment in 2022

- Standard Attainment Tests (SATs).
- Assessing pupils on their knowledge and understanding of the 2014 National Curriculum.
- Externally set assessments in English and Maths.
- All pupils sit the same test.
- They take place during normal school hours, under exam conditions.

What will be assessed?

Reading

- One paper
- Reading booklet and associated answer booklet

SPAG

- Paper 1 – Grammar, punctuation and vocabulary.
- Paper 2 – Spelling

Maths

- Paper 1 – Arithmetic
- Paper 2 – Reasoning
- Paper 3 – Reasoning

Writing

- Continuous teacher assessment

Reading 2022

- Consists of a reading answer booklet and a separate reading booklet.
- They have an hour to read the three texts and complete the questions.
- They can approach the questions as they choose.
- The texts increase in difficulty as they progress through the booklet.
- A total of 50 marks is available.

Reading 2022

- Questions are designed to assess the comprehension and understanding of a child's reading.
- Inference and deduction skills are assessed and they will be expected to answer questions based on author choices.
- Questions are either multiple choice, require short answers, or an extended response/explanation.

SPAG (Spelling and Grammar)

- **Paper 1** – Assesses grammar, punctuation and vocabulary knowledge (45 minutes). Short answers and some multiple choice questions.
- **Paper 2** – Spelling assessment. The children are provided with an answer booklet to complete by writing in the missing words. The words will be read out loud to them.

- Paper 2 & 3 – Reasoning (40 minutes each). They will need to answer questions in context and decide what is required to find a solution.

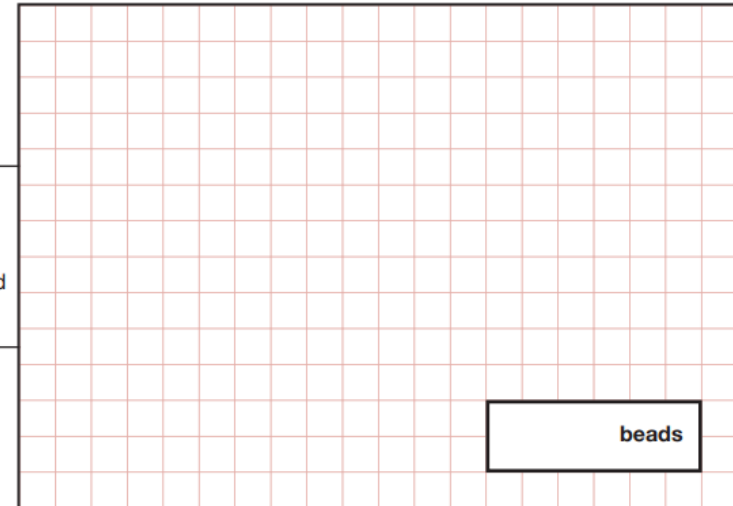

Writing

- Teacher assessment will be used to assess children's writing composition.
- Children's results for English writing will be a judgement of their work throughout Year 6.
- Children's grammar, punctuation and spelling skills will be assessed as part of their writing, but their creativity and writing style will also be evaluated.
- Children are expected to be able to write using a range of different genres.

When are the assessments?

All KS2 SATs will be held in the week beginning 9th May 2022.

The tests **must** be taken on the scheduled days.

Access Arrangements

- Access arrangements are primarily based on normal classroom practice, so we should already be aware of any specific needs.
- These include: additional time, readers, rest breaks, scribes and transcribers.
- If a child is provided with access arrangements they may take the assessments with an adult in a separate room not with the class.

Marking

Tests are marked externally. Once marked, the tests will be given the following scores:

- A raw score (total number of marks achieved for each paper);
- A scaled score;
- A judgement on if the National Standard has been met.

Scaled Scores

- A scaled score of 100 is judged to have met the 'national standard' in the area judged by the test;
- Between 111-120, they are working at a greater depth/ above the expected national standard.
- Between 80 and 99, they are judged to have not yet met the national standard and performed below the expectation for their age.

The raw score that equates to 100 might be different every year as the questions are different.

What will happen?

- Year 6 breakfast club from 8.15am Mon-Thurs that week.
- Children will take the assessments in the classroom unless they have access arrangements.
- They will be provided with all the resources they need.
- Adults from throughout the school will help and support.
- Lots of well-being support and activities throughout the week.
- Celebration Friday!

Helping at Home

- Lots of sleep and rest the week of and leading up to SATs.
- Ensure your child has the best possible attendance at school and is on time.
- Support your child with any homework tasks.
- Encourage your child to talk about their anxieties, a little bit is normal.
- If they feel ill the morning of an assessment, let us know.
- Provide lots of praise and encouragement!

Please remember!

- SATs focus on what children know about Maths and English – they do not highlight their talents in other subjects.
- SATs don't tell the whole story – their results will say if whether they meet a certain standard but not by what margin.
- SATs are only four days out of a whole Primary School career – there's one or two papers each day that last 30 to 60 minutes.
