



The Art of Keeping Going

I have spent the last 6 months keeping an eye on the social media of the Seas the Day Pacific row. If you haven't been following it, it has been an example of the most amazing bravery and dedication. Two young women, Mims and Jess set off from Peru to row, unaided, all the way to Cairns in Australia. They are raising money for The Outward Bound Trust.

It was a mighty row and they have been immense. Dealing with all sorts of issues on the way, as well as rowing the 8000+ miles across the ocean. Their posts on social media showed their commitment and courage as well as great mental and physical strength.

They rowed together in Velocity their 9.14m ocean rowing boat. It was equipped with Solar panels which powered their navigation systems, their water desalinator which had its issues along the way and of course, food and survival equipment. They rowed night and day, week after week, in huge waves, and this week after rowing 8,213 nautical miles in just 165 days they landed in Cairns, Australia. It was the most amazing feat to watch never mind to actually accomplish. To give you some context about how amazing their achievement is, more people have walked in space than have rowed across the Pacific Ocean.

I am so impressed by the fact that they kept going, that they did not give up. It just so happens that as I was keeping up with the last few days of their mammoth task that I was preparing a sermon on Luke 18 which begins

Jesus told his disciples a parable to show them that they should always pray and not give up. Luke 18:1

Here Jesus tells a parable about a woman who keeps going, keeps persisting and doesn't give up. Jesus told it to encourage the hearers to keep going in prayer, to keep going even when it seems tough. How easily do we give up on things? How easily do we stop praying?

Keeping going was essential for the Seas the Day girls Pacific Row. Keeping going in prayer is essential for a daily walk of faith. How is your praying going? Keep Going!



Barnaby's Channel Swim for MANUP? (Men's Mental Health)

We have just returned from ten days in a very sunny, beautiful Cornwall. The Penwith peninsula was glowing in this Indian Summer. The night skies were clear, allowing the millions of stars to be visible in the inky blackness above. Fabulous for star gazing and looking at the Milky Way, making me feel very small and insignificant.

However, even if we humans are insignificant in this vast universe, there are significant things we can do whilst here on earth to help others and maybe make our mark.

As usual we attended services at St Levan Church, this time it was twice. On the second Sunday we were there, a lovely young man, Barney, had been invited to speak about the mental health charity specifically for men, MANUP? He had become interested in this because he had a family member and a few school friends who were struggling, especially since the isolation of Covid. This charity encourages men to speak about their issues and challenges whilst taking part in fun activities such as various sports, walking, camping, gardening, beach barbecuing etc. It also has a dedicated twenty-four hour call line and is definitely reaping good results. Barney said this year four people had admitted to the groups that being a part of MANUP? had made them reconsider taking their own lives.

Barney is an excellent swimmer and attends Mount Kelly School which has a number of Commonwealth and Olympic swimmers amongst its alumni. At the age of fifteen he told his coach he wanted to swim the English Channel. So from that moment on his training was focused on this goal.

The process is quite complicated and you have to apply many months in advance and fit the criteria, including being able to swim unassisted in very cold water for at least six hours. There are only three swim spots each quarter, so if you are granted one it is very precious. You also have to provide your own support team.



Once all this was in place Barney was seventeen. He attended a training camp in Croatia swimming in really cold lakes. However he failed to reach the six hours required, without having to be taken out, a freezing, quivering mess (his words). Apparently in a fit of anger he asked his coach, "Why can fat, old people do it and I can't?" That was the eye opener, it wasn't his age stopping him, it was his weight. He needed to bulk up. In order to reach his swim window this needed to be done in two months. He began eating 7000 calories a day and quickly gained 20kg. He managed his six hour swim and met all the criteria so his swim date was secured.

On the morning of the swim he was up for 2.30am and after a huge cooked breakfast was on the beach at Dover for the 4.00am start. Swimmers are only allowed to wear normal trunks and a thin-film of vaseline. (No more, goose fat as in the past). On entering the water he was supported by his coach, brother and father who encouraged him all the way. They fed him with jelly babies and chocolate at thirty minute intervals. He had requested not to know how far he'd swum or how long he'd been in the water. He said he could see France the whole time but it just never appeared to be any closer. At one point he became really frustrated and nearly gave up, but he then said he just kept the mantra Man-Up in his head until his family made him aware of the landing rocks now very close. As part of the rules the swimmer is not allowed any assistance leaving the water. He remembers it being not a pretty sight as he heaved himself, walrus like, out of the water.

Sadly he couldn't celebrate in France because since Brexit he'd have been breaking the law having not been through passport control etc. He was helped back onto the support boat where he was warmed up with hot drinks, soup and dry clothes. It wasn't until he was properly warm and fed that he was told his time of 9 hours and 40 minutes. This was the fastest time for crossings in the previous three years and the fastest time for an under eighteen in the last ten years. What an achievement! The initial amount raised was £12,000 but this is increasing all the time as people discover his Just Giving page. The collection from St Levan was given in its entirety to the charity.

During the race Barney lost 4Kg of his additional weight and the rest came off very quickly as soon as he reverted to eating 2500 calories per day.

Barney stayed for coffee after the service answering lots of questions and enjoying the fellowship of this lovely church community.

The vicar, Adam, wasn't there as he was on holiday himself. However, I can report that he has slotted into the Cornish way of life very easily. He loves to take a service on the beach, in the woods and fields. He has also

embraced some of their church traditions, including Pimm's and Hymns, Snail Racing in the church yard, the Garden Fete where he apparently sat in the stocks for cream pie the vicar and he will be leading Harvest Feast weekend. Saturday is spent cleaning and clearing the graveyard. Many of those in the churchyard have fascinating histories and these have been written up and displayed inside the church. Those less able in the congregation will keep the drinks and snacks coming for the workers outside. Following the Sunday service the feast this year will be a ProPasty and Pud eaten in the church whilst being entertained by Newlyn Shanty Band. We are very sorry to miss this and need to plan around these things next year.

Having three churches to serve a couple of fellowship leaders have been appointed to deliver "The Service of the Word" when Adam is unavailable. Instead of a sermon they are encouraged to invite a speaker to join them. Often from whichever charity they are supporting that quarter. For such a tiny church trying to raise £3 million towards their roof repairs and general upkeep, they are incredibly generous with the charities they support.

They are looking forward to Adam's first Christmas with them. We will return in the Spring to see what the good people of St Levan have been up to.
