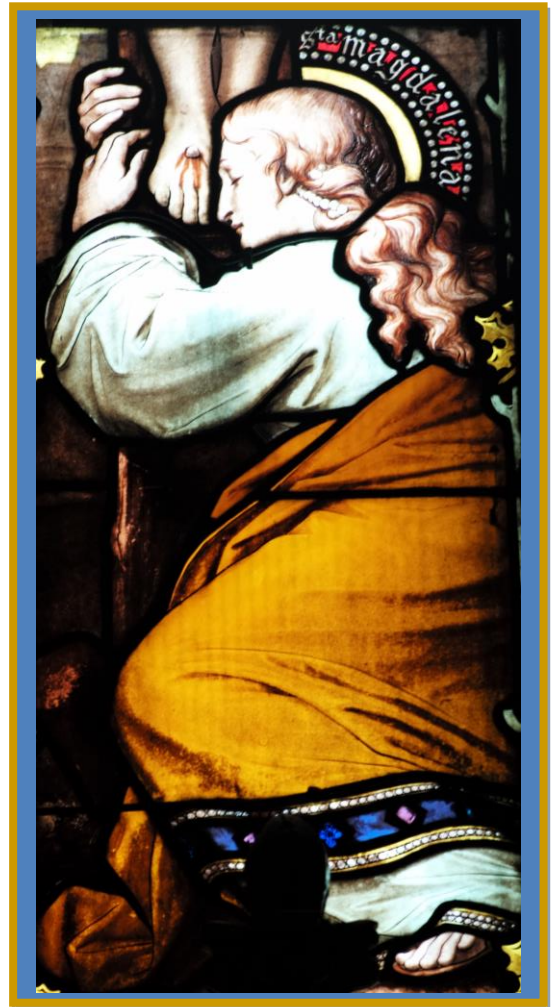

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Preparation is everything. Lent 2026

When we decorate we know that preparation is everything. Preparing the room, preparing the surfaces, preparing the materials.

Before we go on a long journey we make sure we have got everything we need packed. We check the tyres, oil, and water on the car. We make sure we have the postcode for the satnav.

When we listen to musicians in concert as we have been able to do in both churches in the last couple of months, we know that they are not stood up there winging it, they have spent hours and hours in practice and preparation.

When sports teams play in a new formation they prepare thoroughly. Watching videos and tactical set ups, they walk through positions and match play scenarios. They train for the new way of playing.

Preparation is everything. And that is why Lent is such a helpful time for Christians. In the same way that we prepare for things in our everyday lives, Lent is significant in the preparation for remembering Jesus' death and resurrection at Easter. It is a 40-day season (Sundays are not included) that span from Ash Wednesday until Easter Sunday. It is a time to reflect on the Bible, to abstain from things to help focus our prayer. Lent encourages us to prepare our hearts and minds, to refocus, to stop and reflect on all Jesus has done. To put into practice what the Psalmist wrote

"Be still, and know that I am God" Psalm 46:10

Let us use the gift of Lent to prepare. To stop striving and straining, to stop worrying and ready ourselves to remember the joy and wonder of Easter.

At St Peter's and St Leonard's we will be running a Monday morning reflection time during Lent. The first session will be 23rd February at 11am at St Peter's Hall. All are welcome. We will be using the Church of England's Draw Near resources.

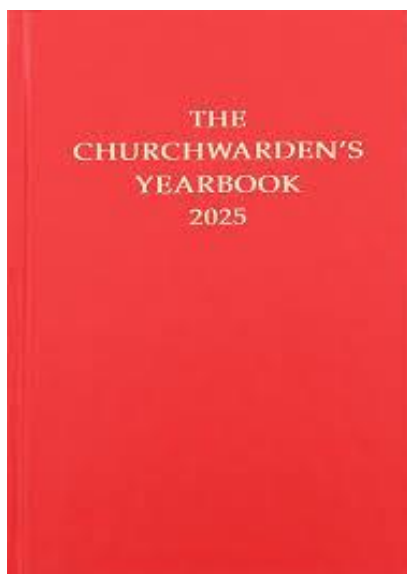

Our current **Churchwardens** will be stepping down from their role at the 2026 APCM. If you feel you may be interested, please speak to them for more information.

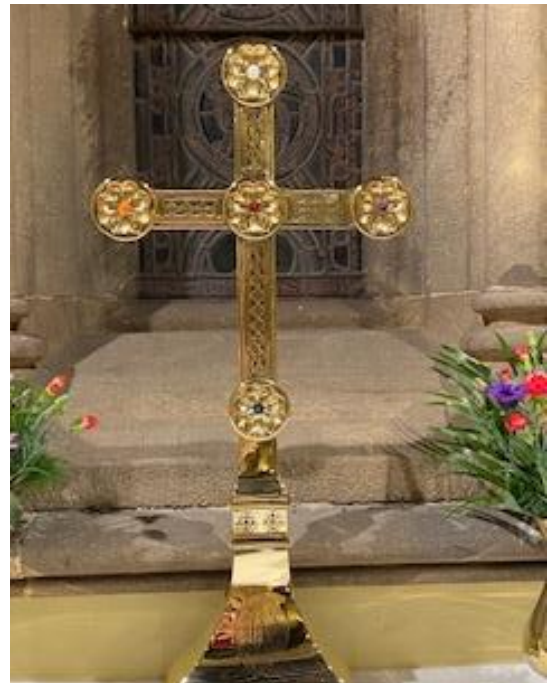
Our **Secretary** has announced that she will be stepping down from the secretarial role at the 2026 APCM. Please consider if you could take on this role.

News from Warmingham CE Primary

What's happening in school this half term?

Otters' Class

Last term, Otters explored the theme of **Celebrations**. The children learned about different celebrations from around the world and shared their own special family events. They enjoyed taking part in role play, stories, music, and art activities linked to celebrations such as birthdays, festivals, and cultural traditions. Through this theme, the children developed their communication skills, creativity, and understanding of how people celebrate in different ways.

*"I know that people have celebrations around the world and not just in our country and these celebrations are very special to the country they are in."
"Lots of countries around the world celebrate with fireworks or have a big party."*

This term we begin with our study theme '**Ticket to Ride**', children will explore different ways we travel and go on exciting journeys in and around **London**. Using the key text **Naughty Bus** by Jan Oke, we will follow the adventures of a bus as it travels through the city, helping children learn about stories, directions, and everyday transport.

The children will learn about different **modes of transport**, such as buses, trains, cars, bikes, and boats. We will look closely at famous **London landmarks** the bus might pass, including bridges and buildings, and talk about what makes them special.

We will also compare London to **our local area**, noticing similarities and differences in transport, roads, buildings, and places we see every day. Through stories, play, maps, and role-play, children will build their understanding of the world around them while developing language, curiosity and confidence in talking about their own journeys.

Hedgehogs' Class

Last half term the Hedgehogs enjoyed our study theme which focused on 'In and Around Our School'. The children really enjoyed utilising their artistic skills when they made their monster front covers and their own fairy tale collages.

The children were captivated by the book '**Nibbles the Book Monster**' by Emma Yarlett and they were keen to try and capture him to stop him from

nibbling anymore books. The children have even designed and made their own cages to try and stop his antics!

This half term we will be exploring the book '***The Lion Inside***' by Rachel Bright. We have begun our study theme by receiving a parcel from a zookeeper asking for our help with some animal facts. We will then continue our learning by sketching lions using graded pencils and charcoal.

As writers we will be using our story to inspire our own narratives with new characters. As geographers we will be developing our learning from the Autumn term by exploring places around the equator.

As scientists, we will begin to explore everyday materials. We will be identifying a range of materials and exploring their properties.

As designers we will be designing and creating our own lion masks inspired by our story. We cannot wait to share all of our learning with you.

Squirrels' Class

Squirrels' Class embraced the chill with an exciting theme inspired by the book, ***Winter's Child***. Our learning included:

Science: We explored States of Matter, focusing on how water changes state, and even experimented with making ice!

Geography: We studied weather patterns and compared them to the Arctic climate.

Design Technology: We designed and created shell structures of icebergs and igloos, combining creativity with engineering skills.

Music: Inspired by Antonio Vivaldi's Winter from The Four Seasons, we learned to play instruments and sing.

Computing: We learned about emails and how to use them effectively. Also how vital this technology is for the Scientists in the Arctic.

PE: We practiced gymnastics and circuits to keep active during the colder months.

Climate & Sustainability: We learned about human impact on the polar icecaps and how this is changing the lives of polar bears.

The term ended with a magical Winter Wonderland. We then made our own snow (because at that point, the real Arctic climate had not arrived) and had a snowball 'fight'.

"I loved making the igloo – it was tricky but fun!"

"Learning about the Arctic made me want to visit there one day."

"The music was my favourite – Vivaldi's Winter sounded like a snowstorm!"

This half term we are stepping back to the Stone Age.

Our new study theme, inspired by '**Stone Age Boy**', began with an exciting artifact exploration! Squirrels' Class examined real and replica artifacts, making predictions based on details stated and implied. From these clues, we developed ideas about what our new study theme might involve and discussed our thoughts about the story behind the book.

We're building historical enquiry skills by asking questions and imagining life thousands of years ago. To make our learning even more immersive, we are expecting a visit from an archaeologist and perhaps even a Stone Age man, later this week!

Our study theme learning this half term includes:

History: Understanding how Britain changed from the Stone Age through the Bronze and Iron Ages.

Badgers' Class

Crime and Punishment – A Half Term of Discovery!

Last half term, our theme was *Crime and Punishment*, inspired by ***The Lost Happy Endings*** by Carol Ann Duffy and Jane Ray. We began with an unforgettable visit to Shrewsbury Prison, which the children absolutely loved. They were fascinated by the harsh punishments of the past and all agreed they were glad not to have lived in those times!

Throughout the term, the children explored justice and morality through stories, history, art, and debate. They developed their writing skills by creating traditional tales with a twist, deepened their reading comprehension, and learned how crime and punishment have evolved from Roman times to the present day. Creative projects included graffiti-inspired art, remembrance-themed designs, and expressive dance, while practical challenges in design, coding, and music encouraged problem-solving and teamwork.

It was a rich and varied learning journey that sparked curiosity, creativity, and thoughtful discussion about fairness and consequences — lessons that will stay with them for years to come.

This Half Term's Adventure!

This half term, Badgers are setting sail on an exciting voyage into the world of **Vikings**, inspired by our quality text ***Arthur and the Golden Rope*** by Joe Todd-Stanton. Our learning will be packed with creativity, discovery, and big questions!

As Artists, we'll explore how Vikings were pioneers of craft and trade. We'll then roll up our sleeves and develop our sculpture skills using one of their great inventions – the potter's wheel!

As Historians, we'll investigate fascinating Viking artefacts and uncover how these fearless explorers conquered and settled across four continents. We'll also examine the innovations that shaped their lifestyle and compare Viking resource use to modern sustainability challenges. Were the Vikings sustainable? We'll research, debate, and learn lessons for today.

As Musicians, we'll harness the power of the human voice to create dramatic performances inspired by Norse legends. Expect bold, atmospheric compositions that capture the strength and spirit of Viking sagas!

As Writers, we'll become myth-makers! After crafting vivid settings and powerful dialogue, we'll write our own epic tales, choosing words carefully to captivate our audience.

As Theologians, we'll dive into the book of Daniel, discovering the deeper meaning behind his story and reflecting on faith, choices, and courage—both in ancient times and today.

As Computer Scientists, we'll unlock the secrets of databases, learning how to store, organize, and retrieve information efficiently. By the end, we'll design and query our own databases to solve real-world problems.

As Sports People, we'll shine in two areas:

- **Gymnastics:** mastering matching and mirroring movements to create fluent sequences with precision and creativity.

- **Swimming:** building confidence and competence in the water, swimming at least 25 metres using a range of strokes, and learning vital water safety skills.

This half term promises to be full of creativity, challenge, and discovery. We can't wait to see Badgers embrace every moment of this Viking-inspired adventure!
