Things that you might like to do at home to support your child's topic learning:

Reading:

We will continue to find out about different authors this half term as well as looking at different types of text. The author we are focusing on is Jane Hissey. We will visit the library every Tuesday. Please read these books to your child, however, let them read their Read, Write, Inc. book to you.

Things that you can do to help your child with their writing:

- Encourage your child to write on lines.
- Remind your child how to form the letters correctly and where to position them on the line. For example, the letter g hangs down below the line.
- Encourage your child to use finger spaces in between words.
- Continue to develop your child's fine motor control, give them opportunities to use the muscles in their hands in different ways, e.g. cutting with scissors, threading and squeezing playdough.
