Nursery

This week, the children enjoyed a singing session with Mr Wilson. They sang along to familiar songs and joined in with the actions.





Year 1

This week, Year 1 have been celebrating maths week. We helped Charlie Bucket move through the chocolate factory safely by solving addition and subtraction problems to unlock the next level.







Year 2

This week in Reading, we have introduced our new fiction book; In Every House, On Every Street. After listening to the story, these children thought about which room was the best and why. To share their ideas, the children completed a chaired discussion.







Year 3

This week in Science Year 3 had lots of fun learning all about how changing the light affects what we can see. We tried to get the classroom as dark as possible which was lots of fun.







Year 4

This week, Year 4 have been transported to ancient Rome to learn all about what life would have been like and the influence that the Romans had on life in Britain. We used the drama technique, guided tour to learn more about the colosseum and how the Romans would have used it for entertainment – we couldn't believe some of the things they used to watch!









Year 5

This week, we have been diving into our new topic Harry Potter. We revealed new words and clues which related to our new topic and writing. We stepped into the magical world of Hogwarts and the sorting hat placed different students into the current houses, however, there was a problem when one child had traits and values for all of the houses and even some traits that didn't fit. The sorting hat left us with the problem of needing a new house. Professor Dumbledore met with us and asked us to create sculptors, which represent the four houses. Then, he commissioned us to design and create a new house for Hogwarts, which had values that the others didn't.





Year 6

In Science this week, we have been classifying and grouping living things. We began by thinking of our own ways to group animals. For example, animals that live on land, animals that can fly, animals that have less than four legs. We then learnt about the characteristics of mammals, reptiles, amphibians, fish, birds and insects and were able to successfully group animals under these headings.


