


Year 5 Migration

migration	A person who moves away from his or her place of usual residence temporarily or permanently.
inlet	A narrow strip of water which goes from water into the land.
pull factors	Things that attract people to a place.
push factors	Things that make people want to leave or move
emigrated	The act of leaving the country you live in with the intent to settle in a different country
immigrant	A person who chooses to move to another country
self-reliant	To be independent and act and think for yourself
persecution	when a person or group of people is mistreated by a person or group for their beliefs and customs.
refugee	someone who is forced from their home country due to a number of different factors, such as war.
asylum-seeker	a refugee before they are legally recognised as seeking help
High demand	When a lot of people want something.





Over 800,000 years ago, England wasn't populated at all! The first people migrated here during the Stone Age.

Everyone who now lives in the UK has either migrated to the UK or is a descendent of migrants.

Some people move to different places within the same country. Migrating from one part of a country to another part is called <u>in</u>ternal migration.

International migration involves crossing borders between countries.




Moving into a country is called immigrating
