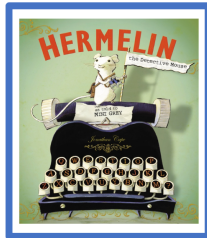


# Year 1: Hermelin



## Grammar

<b>noun</b>	they name people, place and things
<b>conjunctions</b>	words used to extend sentences when, if, that, but because, and
<b>adjective</b>	a word that can be used before a noun, for example - some really good work, or after a verb, for example - their work was good
<b>noun phrase</b>	a group of words to describe - a blue butterfly or the man in the moon
<b>prefix</b>	added to the beginning of a word to create a new word - for example kind - unkind, happy - unhappy
<b>endings</b>	Adding 's' and 'es' to words - if the ending sounds like 's' or 'z' it is spelt as -s. If the ending sounds like 'iz' it is spelt -es.
<b>verb</b>	a word to describe an action or tells us something is happening
<b>question</b>	a sentence that asks you something and ends with a question mark - ?

## Vocabulary

<b>detective</b>	A person whose job is to investigate and solve crimes
<b>typewriter</b>	A machine with keys that types numbers or letters one at a time
<b>pest</b>	An annoying person or thing, or a destructive animal
<b>hurl</b>	To throw with force
<b>suspects</b>	A person thought to be guilty of a crime
<b>mysteries</b>	Something that is difficult or impossible to explain
<b>clues</b>	A piece of evidence used to detect a crime
<b>reward</b>	A thing given in recognition for service or effort
<b>adventurous</b>	Willing to take risks or try something new
<b>solve</b>	To find an answer or explanation for something
<b>thrilled</b>	A sudden feeling excitement
<b>residents</b>	A person who lives somewhere permanently or long term
<b>injured</b>	Harmed or damaged
<b>invitation</b>	A written or verbal request inviting someone to go somewhere

<b>A detective narrative</b>	A story that involves a detective solving or working to solve a crime. A crime is introduced and investigated.
<b>A letter</b>	A written or typed communication sent in an envelope by post.
