

The Vicar writes...

I wonder what St Paul would write in a letter to the world? Would he be shaking his head in shock and concern about how we are treating each other. The persecutions caused by humanity to humanity. Would he condemn the lack of care for the recourses of the world? Is there reason for Paul to become Saul again and convict us of our crimes? When Paul wrote to Corinth he wrote with encouragement and not condemnation. He suggested ways in which they could change and become closer to God and continue the work of Jesus and become better Christians. He highlighted to them what they already had and how to use it to the best of their ability with the help and support of God and others in faith. So here is my take on a letter that Paul might write to the Benefice of Tarvin, the Churches of St Andrews and St Peters. "To my beloved, the people of Tarvin, Duddon and surrounding villages. Greetings from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ. It is a blessing to hear and see all the wonderful things you have done. From the coffee morning that inspired people to come together in fellowship and unity to the Z team who tirelessly work outside in all weather conditions. There are so many people involved in the church making it vibrant and welcoming I am unable to mention all of them, however, you are doing wonderful work in the name of Christ and using the gifts that God has given you, putting them to good use. Use the gifts that you have been given to profit the kingdom of God, where there is hatred show love, where you are persecuted for your faith or made fun of show compassion. The troubled world in which we live is one we are trying to mend, and the discompassionate world in which we live has forever been with us. We strive as best we can to teach others the way of faith, to share the compassion that we have, to turn even the most discompassionate nature of others into the love and fellowship of faith. I implore you to remember that meeting together in prayer and worship is most

important to find strength in the wisdom of God's word and to stand together, with support as you minister to this world. May God give you wisdom and understanding in the world that you are part of, strengthen you with the Holy Spirit so that you may never tire of the tasks that you have in your lives. Finally may Jesus be the light that shines in the darkness guiding you always."



A Christmas Wedding at St George's, Hanover Square

In late December in 2021, during partial restrictions following the lockdown periods, I was excited but anxious to be invited to a Christmas wedding at St George's in London. We travelled by train the night before. Although the streets sparkled with the festive decorations they were almost deserted. It felt very strange.

The following morning in the lovely winter sunshine we walked to St George's church. St George's is the parish church of Mayfair. It was built between 1721 - 1724 in the classical style. At that time there was a need for fifty churches to be built.

St George's was known as the wedding church. President Roosevelt, the poet Shelley, the novelist George Elliot, Amy Johnson and Guglielmo Marconi were all married there.

The church is beautiful inside. The organ was built in Tennessee, USA and is the only American built organ in London. One of the beautiful stained glass windows is made of Flemish glass, which was believed to have been looted by Napoleon

Above the altar is a painting of The Last Supper by William Kent in the 17th century style of the French painter Nicolas Poussin. One of its best known parishioners is George Friderick Handel



who lived nearby. He had his own pew and was a regular worshipper. During the wedding service the church choir sang The Alleluia Chorus and the beautiful organ sounded splendid indeed. It certainly was a happy and memorable occasion.

This year, William's Wood chose St Andrew's and St Peter's Churches as beneficiaries for their charitable output. What this means is that for every member of the congregation who avails themselves of William's Wood products or services, ranging from firewood, bean poles through to attendance at events or activities like apple pressing or family school holiday activities, a percentage will be given to the Churches on April 5th 2026 and we can claim gift aid too.

Firewood is sold, certified as Ready to Burn under Certificate WS4344, in single nets or multiples. The current log net price is £5.25 inc VAT at 5% and we are given 50p per net. Collect your wood from William's Wood or for orders 8 nets or more, in multiples of 8, delivery to the villages of Tarvin and Duddon are inclusive. 40 nets is a tight stacked cubic metre.

They don't deliver tipped bulk loads because nobody really looks forward to receiving and dealing with a pile of logs on the driveway, and the drivers will stack the nets wherever you want as long as it is easily accessible from the road with a sack truck.

Even if you don't burn firewood yourself but know someone who does, as long as they mention the Churches at purchase, the donation will be made.

A glass of Buck's fizz welcomed our members and visitors as they arrived. They were then able to browse the stalls and take part in guesswork to try to win 2 generous seasonal hampers.

Charismata was the title chosen by Debbie Davies for her demonstration. The word is Greek and gives us charisma. This was shown by Debbie as she came onto the stage looking elegant,

Her 1st design represented an open fire which we might sit by to write our Christmas cards. It was a parallel design with whispy autumnal foliage, tropical blooms and spider gerbera.

Debbie's next design was a welcome door wreath. Instead of the usual circular frame she had a part block of oasis and the leaves and flowers radiated. She used sprayed fatsia leaves with an aspidistra bow and red carnations, green chrysanthemums and wired pine cones. A star followed on a large stand with a wire grid backing. The flowers used in this all white arrangement were fantastic and included orchids, silver and white sprayed foliage and an unusual gerbera with a hint of green. For her 4th design Debbie had a large flexible ring with pale mauve drapes to represent the nativity. She used the new plant based foam to hold spruce and hebe along with purple and pink flowers which included small purple calla lilies, large pink gerbera and purple sprayed seed heads.

There had to be a Christmas tree and Debbie had a tall stand adorned with baubles onto which she arranged a triangular design in shades of red and green. There were roses, carnations, gladioli, leucospernum and anthuriums with a few baubles. It was stunning.

Finally we had an angel, Another all white creation designed to cascade. There were roses, lilies and lisianthus, Debbie played Christmas music whilst assembling her angel on a stand with lit up wings and a halo.

The finished stage was a wow. It was colourful, we could see all the designs and there was just the right amount of sparkle. A wonderful display.

After the raffle we had delicious seasonal, mainly homemade refreshments.

What a way to end our floral year. Thanks to all who came and to all who helped to give us such a successful evening.

ACTION SPEAKS LOUDER

Where do you feel safe? or who makes you feel safe? What can we do to ensure that being involved in any Church activity helps you feel safe? The last twelve months has seen the Church of England needing to take action at the highest level for not responding to safeguarding concerns appropriately or in a timely manner.

Archbishop Desmond Tutu is quoted as saying 'There comes a point when we need to stop just pulling people out of the river. We need to go upstream and find out why they're falling in'.

We need to constantly review our Safeguarding policies and practice to ensure we can ensure that people are not falling in, in the first place!

If you saw someone pushed to the ground and their possessions taken what would you do? Would you -

- a) walk by muttering what an awful thing to happen but too busy to stay and help?
- b) consider helping but then think someone else is bound to come to their assistance and what could you do to help anyway? OR
- c) decide that you should be and can be the one to make a difference?

We shouldn't wait for someone else to take action and we can ALL contribute to ensuring that the Church feels a safe place to be when involved in any of the activities that take place in it's buildings or in it's name.

Everyone at the services today received an Action Pledge card. This is to encourage people to make a specific personal commitment through an action, whether that is through prayer, speaking up or finding out more about Safeguarding.

POLLARDING 2025




At the start of 2025, it was decided to bring contractors in to inspect the Lime trees bordering the front pathway to St. Andrew's. A Company called Tree Fellers duly informed us that some major work was required to give the trees a new lease of life. However, as these trees are in the

Conservation area of Tarvin, permission had to be sought from Tarvin Parish Council as well as the CWAC Conservation Officer. Once all this

was cleared, a date was set in November for the pollarding to begin. Top left shows the contractors setting up their hydraulic

platform, and to the right, with it in place to enable the working group to safely access the branches.



as many of the branches were found to be rotten internally once cutting commenced. A decision

was made to leave a small arch in front of the main door to enable the Christmas lights to cross the pathway during December. However, the light supporting wires, were destroyed during the work. These will have to be replaced prior to their installation in December. The contractor assured us that trees are now good for another 100 years!

The Z Team met mid November for their Annual General Meeting in the Parish Rooms. Eleven members were present, plus Adam to give his thanks to the team for their efforts over the past year. In the above photo, left to right, are John, Richard, Wyn, Bill, Rick, Ron, Linda, Martin, David, Peter, Adam and Mark.

Among the items discussed were equipment purchased in 2025, and some tools that has been donated, namely a battery powered hacksaw and an extensive set of sockets, etc.

Mark discussed the costs of running the team in terms of fuel used, replacement/ maintenance items for the mowers, etc., and this came to just over £1000 this year.

Future projects, apart from general maintenance, include an extension to the ashes burial area, a new footpath alongside this area, and clearing up grave areas where gardens have been planted to facilitate improved mowing activities.

A total of ten ashes burials have taken place this year so far. Assuming this is an average year, there are only 18/24 months remaining before the existing ashes burial allocation is full, hence the need for an extended area.

All Things Duddon

Duddon St. Peter's CE Primary School

What an amazing week in Uganda we had, sharing practice and working together with the children and staff at the MLD Kindergarten, Ibanda. Following a safari weekend at Lake Mburra National Park where the giraffes were definitely my highlight, we spent an intense and rewarding week in our partner schools. During the week the staff and I observed each other's teaching and worked together to share songs, stories and rhymes with the children. It is such a privilege to be able to share practice, and I found myself adapting my teaching style during the week to suit the classroom spaces and lesson times the school has.

One of the highlights of the week was sharing the variety of toys and games I had taken out with me, donations from the children and parents at Duddon St Peter's, with both the staff and children. The children loved the blocks, dolls and cars, although quite a few sharing issues had to be resolved! I worked with the staff to teach them some of the games I play with the resources to develop maths and literacy concepts - that was fun!

The children will certainly enjoy the trampoline our donations paid for. The week was an emotional rollercoaster, and a few things will remain with me for a long time. The children are resilient. They have very little, are incredibly independent due to their circumstances and are so happy and welcoming. They are children just like our children - they laugh at the same things, argue about the same things and learn in the same way. Teachers are the same no matter where they work! We are teaching the same things in a slightly different way, and the opportunity to share and realise this is so valuable. I loved working with the staff and children to share our experiences which, although we live in completely different parts of the world, are not always so very different - however those differences should be shared with our children and













parents here to build a greater understanding and appreciation of the world we share.
