Significant places



Vale Royal Abbey

- Lord Edward prayed to God to save him and his crew from a shipwreck. He said he would dedicate himself to God, which he did by building the original Abbey in 1277.
- The small chapel, built outside the gates, later became the parish church of St Mary's in 1542.

Significant events

Remembrance Day

- Remembrance Day is when people take time to remember those who lost their lives in the WW1 and wars since.
- The First World War was from July 1914 -November 1918.
- Remembrance Day is held on November 11th and that this is the day that the armistice was signed in 1918.
- Poppies are used to symbolise remembrance and the lives lost in wars.





Significant people

Sir Muirhead Bone

- During the First World War, he was appointed as the first official war artist. He also did this during World War 2.
- He used a note pad and pencil to recording events including fighting, how the soldiers lived and the destruction of houses and factories.
- He is buried in the graveyard of St Mary's Church.





Edith Cavell

- Edith was a British nurse during the First World War.
- She looked after soldiers from both sides of the war and because of this, she was killed by German soldiers.
