


<p>Personal, Social and Emotional Development</p> <p>Children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - have the opportunity to make new friends - learn our classroom routines - learn where everything goes in their new environment - have the opportunity to share their thoughts and feelings in circle time - be encouraged to talk about their likes and dislikes and begin to identify similarities and differences between themselves and others 	<p>Mathematics</p> <p>Children will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - recognise, name and match colours - learn to sort by colour and make patterns with two colours - play counting games - sing number songs - develop 1:1 counting skills - practise rote counting and number recognition - begin to match quantities to numerals 	<p>Understanding the World</p> <p>Children will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - learn about their bodies and the five senses - begin to observe similarities and differences between themselves and others - given the opportunity to talk about who is included in their family and the times they spend with them - explore the signs of Autumn in the outdoor classroom and wider school grounds 	<p>Communication and Language</p> <p>Children will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> -be encouraged to take part in circle time activities within small groups and whole class - have opportunities to express their views, share stories and become confident to speak in a familiar group - sing a variety of songs and action rhymes such as Head, Shoulders, Knees and Toes and One Finger, One Thumb. - be introduced to new words and discuss their meaning through discussions, stories and as part of a topic or theme - practise listening to stories 1:1 and in groups and then join in with words and actions - begin to recall story events and have the opportunity to re-enact stories in their play
<p>Physical Development</p> <p>Outside children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - have access to outdoors come rain or shine - strengthen their core muscles and develop skills such as climbing, balancing, riding and large mark making <p>Inside children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - develop their fine motor skills through opportunities such as tweezer activities, threading, manipulating playdough, drawing, writing and snipping - practise health and self-care routines including hand washing, blowing their nose and dressing for the outdoor environment 	<p style="text-align: center;">  Nursery Autumn Term 1 Marvellous Me </p> <p><i>In Nursery, we plan activities, ideas and key texts as a starting point. Our flexible approach allows the children to choose the path to their own learning, develop their own ideas and follow what they are interested in within each topic.</i></p>		<p>Characteristics of effective Learning</p> <p>Children will</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - explore the Nursery and find out things for themselves - have the opportunity to play with open-ended resources and use them as they choose - be supported to think of and develop their own ideas -be encouraged to take risks and to try new things - work alongside adults who will help them to work through problems and think about next steps - be given the opportunity to make their own decisions - be encouraged to make links and talk about the process that they are going through - be supported to 'have a go' & 'keep trying' if things become tricky - be given time to become deeply involved in their play & develop their concentration. - be praised for their effort when they persevere
	<p>Expressive Arts and Design</p> <p>Children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - explore simple drawing techniques and will begin to use different line types to create representations; short lines, long lines, thin lines, thick lines and curved lines - have the opportunity to draw their own portrait using a mirror - have access to a wide variety of creative materials - be able to express their own creativity - play with a variety of small world and role play activities to develop expressive language 	<p>Literacy</p> <p>We will be reading the following stories this term:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • The Colour Monster • Peace At Last • Owl Babies • Autumn (Seasons) • So Much <p>Children will:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - learn how to hold books the right way up and turn the pages from left to right. - begin to identify the front and back covers on the books that we share - develop on their upper body strength to support their writing - explore making marks with different tools - develop their understanding of general sound discrimination with a particular focus on environmental sounds
