JASS AWARD

During Year 6, children have the opportunity to work towards their Junior Award Scheme for Schools (JASS) award. JASS is an award scheme for young people which aims to support them through the transition from primary school to secondary school.

For each level of JASS, children will need to complete a set amount of required hours which are structured into four sections:

Adventure: outdoor activity and learning, including team work and problem solving.

Get Active, Stay Active: taking part in sport and physical activity.

My Interests: developing an interest or learning a new skill.

Me and My World: contributing to the local community.

KS2 SATS

KS2 SATs will be held week commencing 8th May 2023.

The 2022 schedule for SATs tests were as follows:

Monday: Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar paper 1 (punctuation and grammar- 45 min) and paper 2 (spelling- approx. 20 min)

Tuesday: Reading (60 min)

Wednesday: Maths paper 1 (arithmetic- 30 min) and Maths paper 2 (reasoning- 40 min)

Thursday- Maths paper 3 (reasoning- 40 min)

SATS INFORMATION

The time and date of each SATs paper is set externally so all test papers are administered at the same time, meaning children need to be in school and won't be able to take it at a later time/date.

SATs are completed in exam conditions i.e rows, silence, invigilators etc. School staff will usually invigilate exams but external invigilators can turn up unannounced.

Papers are sent away to be marked.

These marks are converted into scaled scores- Maths papers are added together and the same for SPaG papers.

The scaled scores range from 80-120. 100 is score needed for children to achieve the expected standard and 110 is the score needed for greater depth.

Writing is teacher assessed against the statements which may be moderated.






Micah handed her a piece of wood from the basket near the stove and reached into the bulky sack he had slung over his shoulder. 'I brought it, just like I said I would.'





WRITING EXPECTATIONS

Working at the expected standard:

The pupil can:

- write effectively for a range of purposes and audiences, selecting language that shows good awareness of the reader (e.g. the use of the first person in a diary; direct address in instructions and persuasive writing)
- in narratives, describe settings, characters and atmosphere
- integrate dialogue in narratives to convey character and advance the action
- select vocabulary and grammatical structures that reflect what the writing requires, doing this mostly appropriately (e.g. using contracted forms in dialogues in narrative; using passive verbs to affect how information is presented; using modal verbs to suggest degrees of possibility)
- use a range of devices to build cohesion (e.g. conjunctions, adverbials of time and place, pronouns, synonyms) within and across paragraphs
- use verb tenses consistently and correctly throughout their writing
- use the range of punctuation taught at key stage 2 mostly correctly (e.g. commas; hyphens; parenthesis using brackets, dashes or commas; semi-colons; colons; inverted commas; apostrophes etc.)
- ullet spell correctly most words from the year 5 / year 6 spelling list, and use a dictionary to check the spelling of uncommon or more ambitious vocabulary
- maintain legibility in joined handwriting when writing at speed.

TOP TIPS FOR SATS

Ensure that children are reading as much as possible at home and the texts they read are a range of genres (fiction and non-fiction) by different authors. The SATs reading paper is very fast paced and gets more difficult as the test progresses. Children will be tested on their vocabulary which can be quite advanced.

Children will need to practise their times tables where possible; although they have completed the times tables tests in Year 4, lots of questions on the arithmetic paper are multiplication and division based and require quick recall.

Children need to be accessing weekly homework and acting upon feedback and suggestions given.
