The EYF S takes a child-centred approach to learning whereby the skills are taught through themes that are led by the children's interests. Apart from the very early stages of the Autumn term, themes are not pre-planned. This enables the curriculum to be inspiring and meaningful to each and every new cohort of children. The skills below will be the focus within the stated term

## Summer Term

As the Sea Goats move into the summer term, the children will be building upon the skills they have learnt and begin the transition into Year i. In phonics the children will begin Phase 4 where no new graphemes are introduced. The main aím of this phase is to consolidate the children's knowledge and to help them learn to read and spell words which have adjacent consonants (cvec) such as trap, string and milk. There will be a greater emphasis on the sight reading of Tricky words and an encouragement for children to talk about what they have read. There will be an increasing encouragement for the children to write about their ideas using simple sentences and a greater emphasis on letter formation. In Maths there will be a deepening exploration of problem solving with an introduction to the measurement of time, sequencing, doubling and halving.

The summer term is a wonderful time for the Sea Goats to explore nature and they will have lots of opportunity to use a variety of scientific equipment (microscopes, magnifying glasses and metal detectors) to undertake different investigations and have the opportunity to plant different vegetables and use healthy ingredients to bake and cook tasty dishes. Parents are encouraged to read the weekly FS Newsletter to keep updated with current learning in Sea Goats class and any potential learning journeys the children will take us on.
