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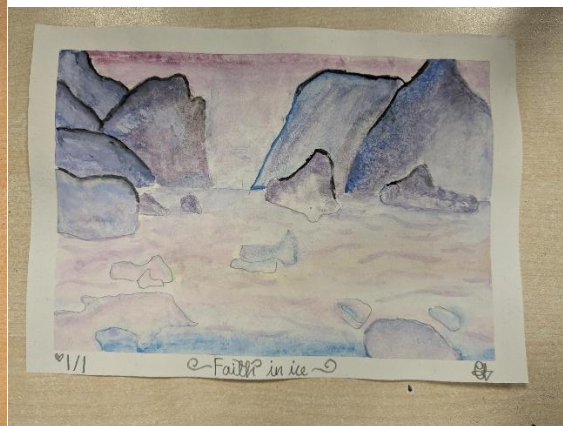
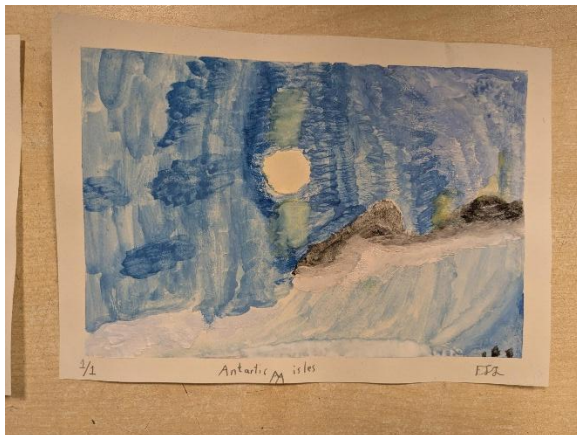
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Buzzards:

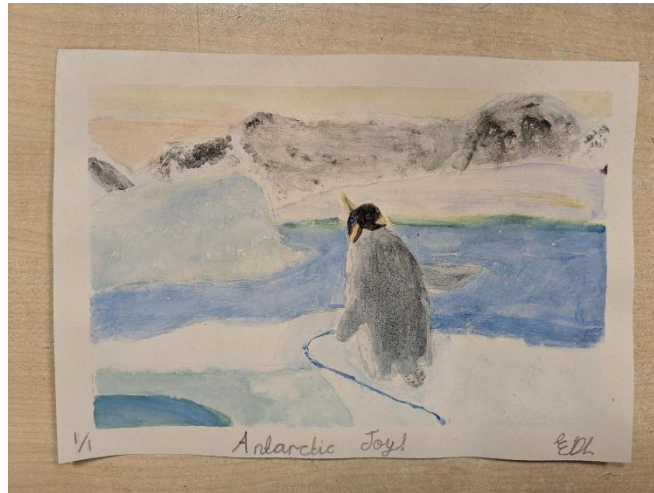

In Maths, we have been playing lots of track games to strengthen our number skills, and we've been exploring parts of numbers and even writing our own addition sentences. The confidence and pride the children show when explaining their thinking is just lovely to see.
