Autumn term Why are we all different and Special Give pupils an understanding that they are unique and special. To know they are loved, valued and made by God. Why Do People of Faith Say Thank You to God at Harvest Time? Give pupils an understanding of why we say thank you to God at harvest time and talk about him being creator. Special People What makes a person special? Give pupils an opportunity to explore Christian values through their own actions and the actions of others. Highlight the role of significant/special people in pupil's lives. Emphasise the ways in which Jesus was a special person. How do Christians Celebrate Jesus' Birthday?
