**Shropshire Overnight Short Breaks Contract Awarded to New Provider** 





The Shropshire Overnight Short Breaks Service is a specialist service delivered from the Shropshire Council owned Bradbury House, providing essential breaks from caring for Parent Carers supporting children with complex needs. Over the past 12 months PACC has supported the recommissioning of this Service, ensuring that feedback from families was central to the design and delivery of the Service.

Currently the Service is delivered by Action For Children, but through the recommissioning process the contract has been awarded to Shaftsbury from 1st April 2026 and they will become the new provider. PACC was involved in all aspects of the recommissioning, including developing the Service specification and scoring the bids. While consideration of value for money is part of the commissioning process the decision-making process is focused on the quality of the Service to be provided. There has been a slight increase in the funding of this new contract.

PACC looks forward to working with Shaftsbury in this new role. We know how much families value the overnight support delivered from Bradbury House and how important this Service is for family wellbeing. PACC will continue to remain involved in the transition period between the current and new provider and will highlight the need for regular and clear communication with families, introducing the new provider and making sure that families are aware of any upcoming changes. Individual support plans will not be impact by this change in provider and levels of support should remain the same.

#### Guidance on Developing School Uniform Policies - Updated 7th November 2025





Updated guidance on developing and implementing school uniform policy is a welcome step forward in the consideration of SEND needs in the school environment. The guidance highlights the importance of governing boards considering the guidance "to help ensure that they comply with their obligations under the Human Rights Act 1998 and the Equality Act 2010".

The update makes it clear that governing boards should be aware of the needs of pupils with SEND and "consider whether certain items of clothing could create challenges" for them. When doing this, leaders need to be aware of how uniform policy "aligns with human rights and equalities legislation" and pupil wellbeing, among other things." There is an expectation that in relation to pupils with SEND school leaders should review "what flexibilities, adaptions, adjustments or alternatives might mitigate any negative impact on these pupils" and in response can adopt "a more comfortable or less restrictive uniform" or a "more flexible policy that allows pupils to choose from a range of items".

The guidance also highlights the need to work in partnership with families to develop and review the school's uniform policy, ensuring that this document is co-produced.

PACC welcomes this new guidance with stronger messages about making reasonable adjustments for SEND pupils. For many years parent carers have highlighted the negative impact of discomfort due to inflexible uniform policies, experienced by many children and young people with SEND. Not meeting this basic need has impacted many young people's ability to access education and damaged school-based relationships. This issue has been championed through the work done via programmes such as Autism in Schools and the Partnership for the Inclusion of Neurodiversity in Schools (PINS), promoting a move to a more inclusive culture within the school environment. PACC has been central to delivering this work in Shropshire and supporting this change to happen.







## Information & Support | Influence & Change



"Shropshire Council ensures that there are different services in place for adults with LD&A including supported living and day opportunities. Day Opportunities for adults with LD&A includes activities and support offered during the day to help people learn new skills, make friends, be more independent, and take part in their community.

Supported Living should enable people to live as independently as possible in their community, with support from staff. This can either involve living by themselves or with other adults who have similar support needs.

# Surveys

PACC collect feedback from Parent Carers and Family Carers via surveys to inform and influence change within the system.

#### **Education, Health and Care Plans (EHCP)**

You can provide feedback on your child/ young person's EHCP-including- Application Process, Annual Reviews, quality of plans and timeliness.



#### Barriers to accessing PA's for 14-25 year old's

PACC are currently collecting feedback from Parent Carers about barriers to accessing PA's for their child/ young person aged 14-25 in Shropshire. Feedback collected in this survey will be used to inform and influence change within current Services available for families to access PA's.



### Childcare for school-age children with SEND in Shropshire

PACC are currently collecting feedback about child care for children in Shropshire with SEND. The feedback from this survey will be shared with Shropshire Council to inform information on the Local Offer and identify any themes in feedback shared. All information shared will be anonymised.

### **Cerebra Launches New Report on System Generated Trauma**



'Systems Generated Trauma is the harm caused by the policies and practices of the public services that disabled children and their families are forced to navigate. While often unintentional, this harm stems from deep-rooted problems that turn the act of seeking help into an ordeal.' – Cerebra Report

Parent Carers and SEND Family Carers have for some time reported that engaging with the SEND system has had a negative impact on their wellbeing. The negative impact of trying to navigate a complex and disorganised system, where finances too frequently take priority over legal duties or wellbeing and families feeling they have to constantly fight for the help they need, has been becoming increasingly obvious. The new report from Cerebra highlights the extent to which this is happening and the damage it is causing.

The Report Summary states;

- 'Systems Generated Trauma' is the harm caused by the policies and practices of public services. Our work with families has identified several problems within the systems that are meant to support them:
- Different parts of the system work separately and don't communicate with each other.
- The system is incredibly difficult for families to navigate.
- Parents often feel blamed for the challenges they face.
- The system doesn't listen to parents or value their expertise as parent carers.
- Families aren't kept informed and decisions aren't explained.
- The system focuses on saving money rather than supporting families.

These are issues that Shropshire Parent Carers and SEND Family Carers often raise with PACC. Recently PACC presented a summary of engagement activity and feedback to the Shropshire SEND and AP Partnership Board which shared these concerns with senior managers of the Shropshire SEND system. You can read this summary here

PACC has repeatedly highlighted concerns about poor Parent Carer/SEND Family Carer mental health, which is being impacted not just by the local situation but the current difficult national conversation about SEND which is often distressing listening for families. We are aware that there is a long-standing issue with the delivery of Parent Carer Needs Assessments in Shropshire, but perhaps of more concern is the lack of clarity about what these assessments when carried out, can actually deliver and how effectively they support Parent Carer wellbeing.




