



Year 4 Curriculum Newsletter – Spring Term 1

Welcome to the First half of the Spring Term!

Welcome back! I hope that you all had a lovely break over the Christmas period and have now settled back into the new term. I have met most parents and carers by now and my door is always open if you have any questions or want to talk about your child at any time. We hope that this newsletter helps you to understand and talk with your child about the learning they will be doing this half term.

General Class Information

- Reading is encouraged as much as possible from the children. Please encourage your child to read regularly at home with an adult for 10 minutes daily, make some time to discuss and ask questions about the text to develop comprehension skills. If that is a struggle, an older sibling can also read with them and get the adult to sign the reading record.
- The children have 1 PE lesson a week on a Tuesday and we still going swimming on a Wednesday until the end of this half term. Please ensure that your child comes to school wearing the correct PE uniform on Tuesdays (school jumper, white t-shirt, black shorts/joggers/leggings and trainers or pumps). We would like our children to always look smart. For swimming; a swim cap is needed for all children, swimming costume or trunks and a towel. The children thoroughly look forward to this every week and all costs are covered for your child to enjoy.



LEARNING MEANS THE WORLD (LMTW) – Window on the World

We will finish off our unit “Cry Freedom” and then move onto “Window on the World” which is a thematic based unit, based on global issues, with a key focus on geography. We begin by looking at settlements and land use, before moving on to learning about trade links. In particular the Suez Canal as an important international trade route will be a focus. We will also learn more about extinction and endangered species, linked to captive breeding programmes. Through this unit, the children will acquire the following knowledge and understanding:

Concept Flow

- To learn about different types of settlements and land use
- To learn about trade links, and the distribution of natural resources including energy and food
- To locate and study environmental problems faced by different continents e.g. extinction



English – Writing

We use the ‘Write Stuff’ approach to teach writing at St George’s. Writing is taught in a sequence so that the children have a clear understanding and model of how to compose a piece of writing, the punctuation they should be using and a broad range of vocabulary to enrich their writing.

This half term our focus is fiction writing and looking at the story *The Great Chocoplot* by Chris Callaghan and *Float* by Daniel Miyares. From this the children will produce their own piece of independent writing

Maths

We use White Rose Maths to plan and deliver the teaching of Maths. For each topic, we work through the following sequence:

- Concrete – using concrete materials, e.g using counters, to model and solve problems.
- Pictorial – drawing pictures of concrete materials to model and solve problems
- Abstract – using mathematical symbols such as $+$ $-$ $=$ and numbers to model and solve problems.

This half term, the children will be learning about multiplication, division and measure. Here are the small steps of learning:
