
Halloween Disco

Why Is Talk Important?

Talking to babies significantly boosts their brain development and language skills. Engaging in conversations builds crucial neural connections and the quality of these interactions is key to their language and learning growth and contributes to their future success.

The benefits of talking to children continues as they pass through the school. Increasingly, children at Junior-school age are drawn to solitary or online activities and spend less time interacting with real people, but it is essential that opportunities to talk are built into every day, both at home and in school. Oracy improves children's outcomes in all areas of learning. These talk opportunities also benefit children not only in terms of their language development, but also in their social interaction and emotional resilience as well, which is key at this age.

Oracy is the ability to express yourself clearly and communicate with others effectively through spoken language. Our Oracy work in school is built around the national charity Voice 21's Oracy framework and is split into four main strands:

- o Physical
- o Cognitive
- o Linguistic
- o Social and Emotional

Oracy is a combination of learning to talk and learning through talk. This means that children are taught specific speaking and listening skills and that talk is used as a central part of their learning across the curriculum. Learning through talk is visible in all subjects in school from PSHE to Maths and PE to Writing.

Children say that Oracy helps them learn, helps them think, helps them talk about their feelings, helps them make friends and helps them feel brave. Oracy helps them feel they belong. Improving children's ability to communicate gives them the power to express themselves and this is another reason why it is an ongoing focus in our school.

Talking with children is both important and beneficial.
