Dojo points are awarded for good behaviour, displaying good values and good work. They can be awarded by any member of staff and are added electronically next to the child's online character.

Mixed-age planning

- Although in some subjects (English, Geography, History etc.), both year groups study the same text / topic, the skills and outcomes for each year group are different and directly link to the National Curriculum expectations for that age.
- We have written our curriculum to ensure it meets the National Curriculum requirements in every year group, regardless of whether it is a mixed-age class or not.
- Teachers make specific reference in lessons to what is expected from each year group.
- We follow a 2-year cycle to ensure skills are embedded, but learning is not repeated.



Reading


Children will read/be heard read/be read to in a variety of ways in school:


- Whole Class Reading lessons
- Independent Reading
- Within lessons



- Children are expected to read for 15 minutes each evening
- It is still important to listen to children read, regardless of age: discuss the book with them and ask them questions
- It is also important that children are read to at home; find a good book, curl up together and share some stories
- Visit your local library and find books linked to our topics
- Check out the 100 recommended book list for Y5/6

English

The National Curriculum places a strong emphasis on vocabulary development, grammar, punctuation and spelling.



Our English lessons are underpinned by a high-quality text and include regular opportunities to develop skills and knowledge of grammatical features, appropriate to each year group.

Throughout each unit, children work towards a 'final piece' of writing, focusing on including different grammatical features that we refer to as 'Mastery Keys'.

In some lessons, children in the different year groups may be expected to do the same or a similar task, but the grammar and punctuation they are taught and expected to use are specific to their year group.

Mastery Keys

Year 5 Mastery Keys

- Use fronted adverbials (Y4)
- Use expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely
 - Link ideas across paragraphs using adverbials
 - Commas after fronted adverbials (Y4)
 - Use of inverted commas and other punctuation to punctuate direct speech (Y4)

Year 6 Mastery Keys

- Use expanded noun phrases to convey complicated information concisely (recap from Y5)
 - Use passive verbs
- Link ideas across paragraphs using a wider range of cohesive devices
- Integrate dialogue to convey character and advance the action



Spelling



- 3 Sessions per week
- Working on a 2-year cycle to allow spelling rules to be embedded
- Review, Explain, Practise, Apply and Reflect model
- Focus on exploring and investigating words and spelling rules
- Weekly spelling lists are no longer sent home but weekly spelling homework is to consolidate learning.
- Each week, a dictated passage is read that includes the words of the previous week.





Maths

Maths lessons follow a Mastery approach, using Power Maths (White Rose) and other supporting schemes and resources. The children are encouraged to explore, investigate and develop their fluency, reasoning and problem-solving skills.

All children have access to manipulatives during their lessons.

Unit themes are matched within mixed-age classes, but lessons and objectives are specific to each year group.



- Concept Maps






Music

Homework

Maths and Spelling homework will be set weekly.

A paper copy is provided and is expected to be glued into the homework books before they are handed in.

All maths homework is linked with the maths lessons for that week (differentiated depending on areas of development for specific children).

Spelling homework is linked with our weekly spelling lessons.

A homework log is kept to keep track of homework/ reading journals handed in.



Homework

Linked to an aspect of the curriculum, children will be given a set amount of time over a half term to complete their own research to plan and prepare their given task. Once completed they will be asked to present to their peers.

Examples of the types of task that may be given

- · History topic prepare an oral presentation to share with the class
- · Design and create a poster share with their class, explain ideas
- · Use technology to create a mini movie
- · Be an author, creating their own characters to develop their story writing
- · Planting seeds write about the process, observe and record changes overtime
- Design a game –explain the purpose of the game
- Provide a set of instruction for a specific activity
