






DONALDSON CLASS





BENJAMIN CLASS

Benjamin Class took part in Maths Week by exploring the story Spaghetti and Meatballs for All! – A Mathematical Story. Inspired by the family banquet in the book, the children investigated how area and perimeter affect the number of guests that can fit around the tables. Using practical square resources, they experimented with different table arrangements and recorded their findings by drawing clear pictorial representations. Through hands-on problem-solving and discussion, Benjamin Class discovered how mathematical ideas can help solve real-life challenges—especially when planning a feast! We also enjoyed solving problems involving time and creating a maths song.













ATTENBOROUGH CLASS

Attenborough Class had an eventful and exciting week as we celebrated both Maths Week and Shakespeare Week! The children were fully immersed in incredible learning experiences that blended creativity, storytelling and exploration.

As part of Maths Week, the class enjoyed diving into maths-themed stories such as Spaghetti and Meatballs for All, using the tale to investigate perimeter, area and problem-solving in fun and practical ways. The children loved working collaboratively and exploring maths through real-world contexts. They have also created and performed a Maths song written to the tune of the song 'I like to move it' from Madagascar.

During Shakespeare Week, Attenborough Class learned all about A Midsummer Night's Dream, discovering the characters, the humour and the magic behind one of Shakespeare's most loved plays. The highlight of the week was their fantastic performance of a scene from Macbeth in assembly-full of expression, atmosphere and budding confidence!

It was a brilliant week of hands-on learning, creative thinking and memorable moments. The children thoroughly enjoyed every minute!



FIBONACCI CLASS

Fibonacci Class had an incredible time taking part in Shakespeare Week. The highlight was joining a drama workshop on *Macbeth*, where everyone got the chance to explore the play's dark and exciting themes. The activities were full of energy and creativity and the class loved stepping into the shoes of Shakespeare's characters. It was a wonderful opportunity to learn more about theatre while having so much fun together.

The excitement didn't stop there, Fibonacci Class performed their part of *Macbeth* to the whole school! It was a proud moment for the class, showing how much they had learned and how confidently they could bring Shakespeare's words to life.





GANDHI CLASS

THOMPSON CLASS

To celebrate **Shakespeare Week - 2025**, Year 5 read an abridged narrative of the play Romeo & Juliet. We explored the different themes present in the play: *love*, *hate*, *grief*. We learnt how Shakespeare used figurative language in his dialogue to create vivid pictures and strong mental images for the audience, as well as exploring the use of *dramatic irony* within the prologue. We then spent a session creating *alternative versions* of the play asking: *what if...?*

What if...

Romeo decides to go to the ball, but Juliet desperately needs to visit the privy. He suddenly lays eyes on an absolute beauty: Juliet's nanny! It was love at first sight! The play becomes: *Romeo & The Nanny*

Romeo accidentally proposes to Juliet's twin sister - June. Even though she has no idea who he is, she is delighted at the proposal and says, "I do." Juliet waits on her balcony for her Romeo to never arrive!

Imagine that the Friar gives Juliet the wrong potion. Instead of falling asleep for 2 days, she turns into a donkey that can only communicate through braying and whinnying.

To end our week celebrating this British Icon - we honed our acting skills with a Macbeth **drama** workshop.

It was a wonderful opportunity for students to connect with classic literature, sharpen their creative writing skills, and celebrate the joy of storytelling.






ART CLASSES
