What we have done this week

NURSERY

DONALDSON CLASS

This week we read a new traditional tale which is part of a 3 week 'Talk for Writing' scheme of work. Our story is 'The Little Red Hen' and we have really enjoyed retelling the story with great expression and with the use of hand actions to help us. This week we become very familiar with the story. Next week we will be inventing new characters and a new setting within the same story frame. AHLBERG CLASS

This week in Reception, the children have been enthusiastic mathematicians as they explored the exciting world of 3D shapes. Through hands-on play, they stacked and balanced shapes, built wonderful creations with magnetic magic tiles, and confidently experimented with different structures. The children did a fantastic job identifying and talking about cones, cubes, cuboids, cylinders and spheres, showing great curiosity and teamwork as they learned together. It has been a joy to see their creativity, problem-solving skills and growing confidence shine throughout playtime—well done, Reception!

In enrichment this Friday, the children enjoyed painting and collaging a London city skyline silhouette.

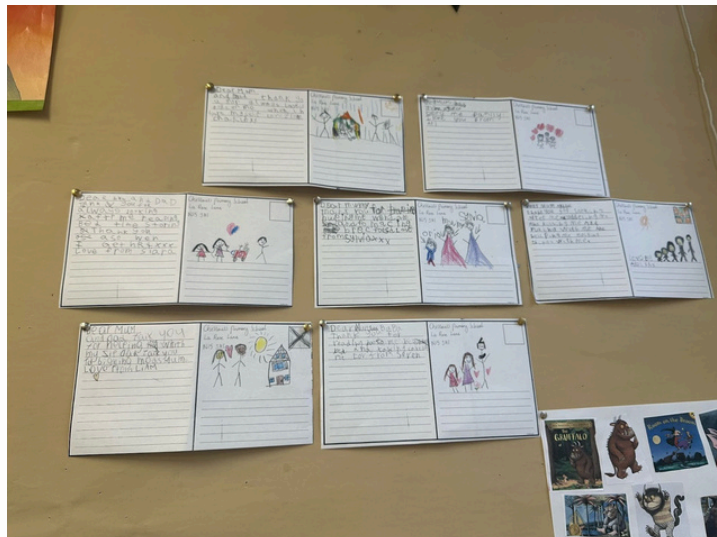

MOZART CLASS

This week, the children in Mozart Class have been enjoying the much-loved story Not Now, Bernard as part of their English learning. The book sparked lively discussions about communication, feelings, and how we show care for the people around us.

To build on these themes, the children created thoughtful appreciation letters for their parents. They took great pride in expressing gratitude, reflecting on the little things families do for them each day. It was a lovely opportunity for them to practise their writing skills while celebrating the important people in their lives.



SEACOLE CLASS

This week in Seacole Class, we explored shapes through a hands-on activity. The children folded a piece of paper in half, drew a shape on one side, and then cut it out. Once opened, they examined what they noticed. This led to a discussion about lines of symmetry and how some shapes can be folded so both sides match perfectly.

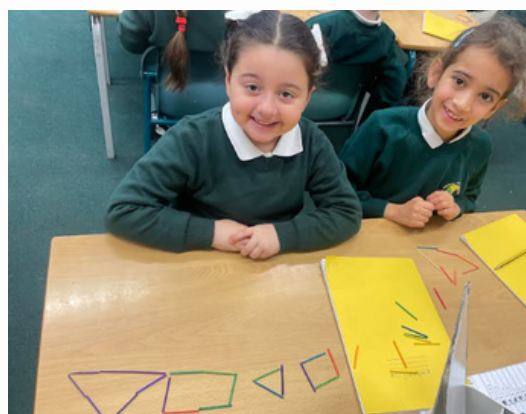
We also talked about how symmetry supports our understanding of division. When a shape can be split into equal parts, it helps us recognise how numbers can also be shared or grouped equally in maths.

This learning links to Article 29 of the UN Rights of the Child, which states that education should develop children's talents and abilities to their fullest. Through creative shape work, the children strengthened both their mathematical understanding and problem-solving skills.



RASHFORD CLASS

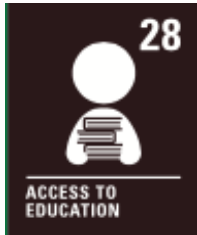
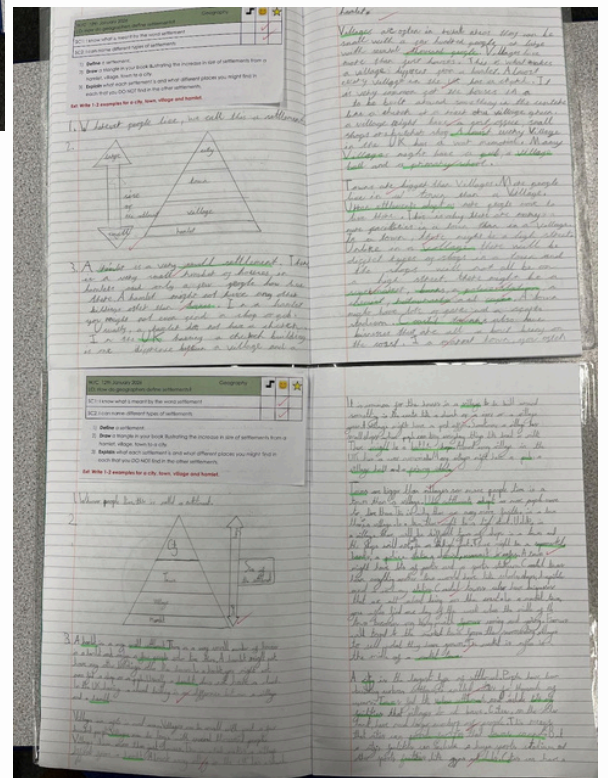
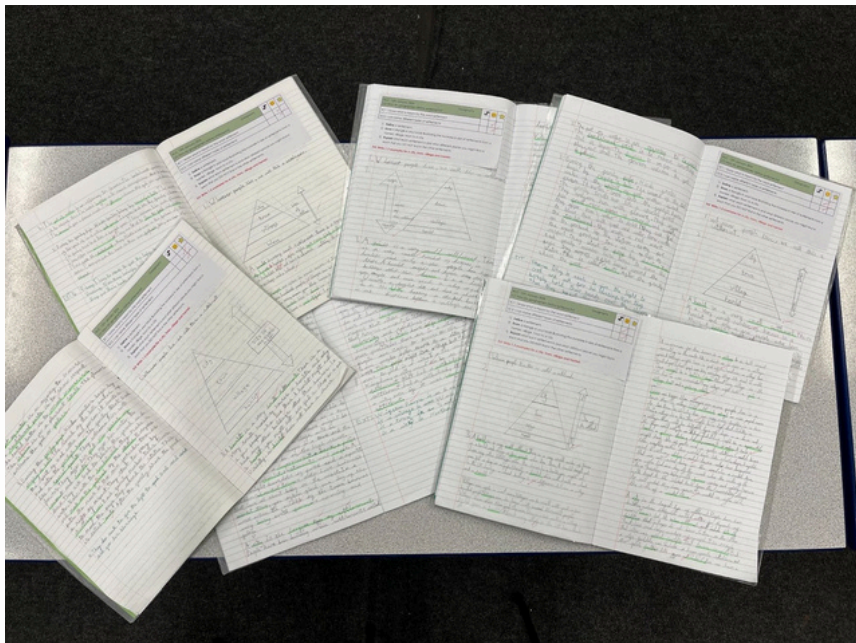
This week we have been learning about 2D and 3D shapes. The children made different shapes using sticks and counted how many vertices and sides each shape had. They learnt tricky words such as polygon and quadrilateral.

ATTENBOROUGH CLASS

This week, in Geography, Year 3 has been exploring different types of settlements, including hamlets, villages, towns, and cities. We have been learning about what makes each settlement unique, from the buildings and transport links to the services and communities found there. Through discussions, maps, and real-life examples, we have developed a better understanding of how people live in different places and how settlements vary in size and purpose. This links to the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child, particularly children's rights to education (Article 28), healthcare (Article 24) and a suitable place to live (Article 27). Here are some examples of our excellent work!



FIBONACCI CLASS

This week, Year 4 took part in a hands-on investigation during our Science lesson, to deepen their understanding of the digestive system. The children recreated the journey food takes through the body and explained the role each organ plays along the way.

The class threw themselves into the activity with great enthusiasm and curiosity. It was a wonderfully memorable lesson, and even when a couple of children felt a little queasy, we were able to turn it into a valuable learning moment—discussing how the body reacts and expels food when something doesn't agree with it.

We're incredibly proud of how engaged and thoughtful the children were throughout the session. Their excitement for science continues to shine.



GANDHI CLASS

What fun the class had in science this week, I have never heard such screams of disgust and delight in equal measure. To help them learn about the digestive system they performed an experiment that involved pushing a banana, cracker, orange juice and water down the legs of some tights. They squealed as the liquid poured out, mimicking the nutrients and water leaving our food into the intestines, until finally they were left with a more solid waste ready to leave out through the anus. It was fabulous watching them all engage so energetically, I bet they could repeat it for you at home if you ask nicely.....

As a wonderful bookend to our Anglo-Saxon units (and a great segway into this term's Vikings), Year 5 battled the January elements and traveled to the archaeological site of West Stow. The children got to explore and identify artefacts from the site as well as experience what it was like to live in the village. By exploring the buildings – all replicas of different designs that would have existed during West Stow village's existence – the children got to immerse themselves in Anglo-Saxon times. What a trip!

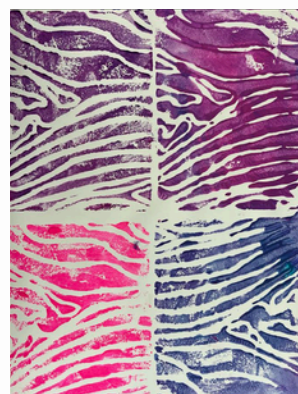
