NURSERY

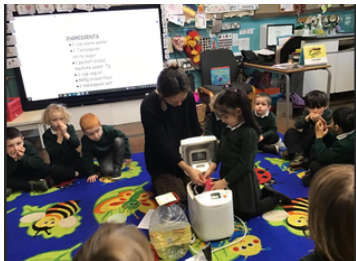

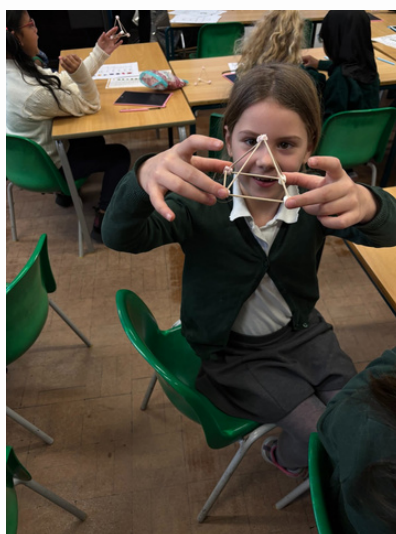
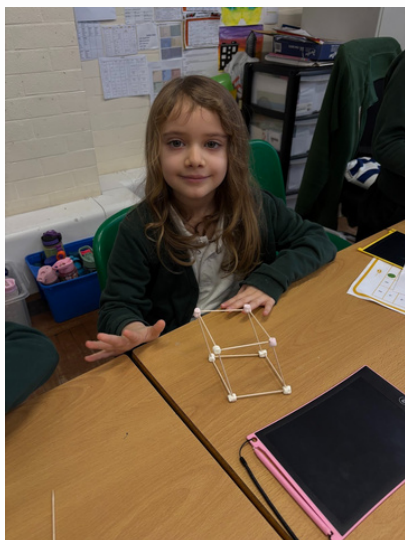
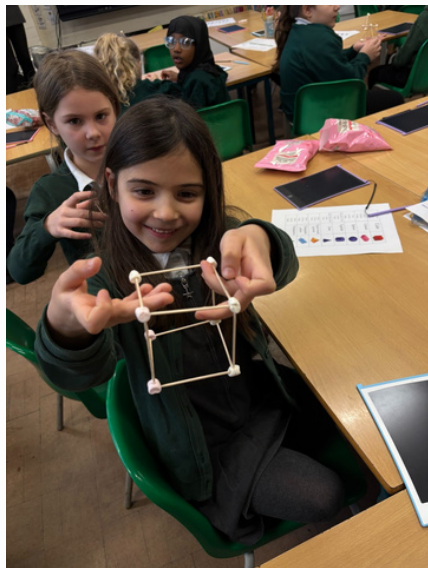


MOZART CLASS

FIBONACCI CLASS

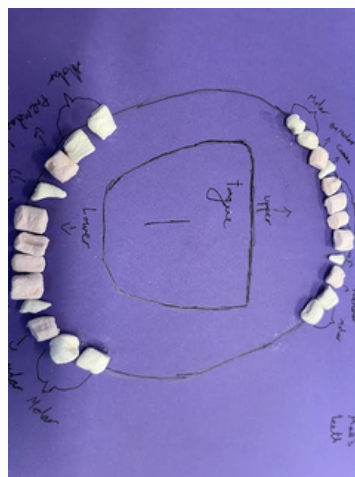
