Shakespeare	Create a fact file about William Shakespeare including facts about his life, plays he wrote and words or phrases from Shakespeare that we still use today	Imagine you are a reporter visiting London during Shakespeare's time. Write a newspaper article about a new play being performed at Globe Theatre.	Rewrite a famous Shakespeare scene in modern language and record yourself performing it.
A midsummer night's dream	Draw and label the main characters of 'A midsummer night's dream' describing their personalities.	Imagine that Puck is on trial for all the chaos he has caused in the forest. Write a speech to the judge to persuade them that Puck is either guilty or innocent.	Build a 3D model of a scene from 'A midsummer night's dream'. Label characters and their emotions at that point in the play.
Friendship	Create a word collage all about friendship. Include qualities you value in friendship and actions that show kindness to others.	Create a colourful and engaging "Guide to Being a Great Friend" for younger pupils. This could include advice, scenarios and tips.	Plan and complete a "Friendship Challenge Week" by choosing 5 positive actions to complete during the week and writing a reflective diary each day.
Reflection of Bunbury experience	Write a short reflection on your time at Bunbury. This could include a challenge you overcame, a proud achievement, and anything you will miss.	Create a 'memory museum' in a scrapbook style highlighting your favourite moments, lessons, trips, and friendships throughout primary school.	Write a letter to your future self to open later in life about what primary school has taught you and your current hopes and dreams.
