Subject	Takeaway Homework
English & History	A Child's WW2 Diary: Write three short diary entries from the perspective of a child living through WW2. Each entry should describe a different aspect of wartime life and include historically accurate details, thoughts and feelings.
English & History	WW2 News Reporter: Become a wartime reporter. Create a newspaper article, radio broadcast, video news report or TV-style news programme about an important WW2 event. Include accurate historical facts and eyewitness details.
History & Geography	WW2 Map Challenge: Create a detailed map showing countries involved in WW2. Include a key, compass, oceans and seas. Add important battles, invasions or events and explain why particular locations were strategically important.
History & Maths	The Great Rationing Challenge: Imagine you are responsible for feeding a family during WW2. Create a one-week wartime meal plan using rationed ingredients. Calculate quantities, costs and leftovers. Then compare your menu with a modern family's weekly menu.
History & Research	The Unknown Hero: Research someone who made an important contribution during WW2. They could be a soldier, nurse, codebreaker, pilot, scientist, engineer, spy, resistance member or civilian. Present their story and explain why their contribution was important.
History & Art	Wartime Propaganda: Research WW2 propaganda posters and investigate the messages they were designed to communicate. Then design your own poster encouraging people to support the war effort, save resources or grow their own food. Explain your choices.
History & DT	Design a Wartime Home: Design and build a model or detailed floor plan of a 1940s wartime home. Include features such as blackout curtains, rationing, food storage and an Anderson shelter. Label and explain your design choices.
History & Music	Songs of the War: Research a song that was popular during WW2. Find out about its historical context and why it was popular. Then perform the song or compose your own piece inspired by wartime Britain.
History & Science	Animals at War: Investigate the role of animals during WW2. Find out how animals helped people during the war and explore one animal's habitat and adaptations. Explain how its characteristics helped it survive and carry out its role.
Science & History	Dig for Victory: Investigate the Dig for Victory campaign. Find out why people were encouraged to grow their own food and explore what plants need to grow successfully. Design a wartime vegetable garden, identifying suitable plants and explaining what they need to survive and grow.
