

adverb	explains how, when or where the verb happens	quickly, fast, immediately, soon
fronted adverbials	words/phrases at the beginning of a sentence, used to describe the action that follows (with comma!)	With a smile, he accepted the award. Next, I sat down.
direct speech ""	the exact words spoken, written using inverted commas ("") punctuation (? . ! ,) goes inside the inverted commas	"I'm hungry," she complained. "What's for tea?" he asked.
metaphor	figurative language - a comparison when something 'is' something else	S/he <mark>is</mark> a star. The room <mark>was</mark> a zoo.
personification	join two main clauses together that both make sense on their own - FANBOYS	for, and, nor, but, or, yet, so
pronoun	replaces a noun to avoid repetition (I, me, my, you, he, she, they, them, it)	First person pronoun: I went on a journey.
abstract noun	nouns you cannot see or touch - an idea, concept or quality	love, hate, fear, anger, pride, courage
Standard English	'correct' English - the use of correct grammar, including verb forms (I <mark>did <u>not</u> I</mark> done) and pronouns (those/them)	We was so worried. We <mark>were</mark> so worried.

Refugee narrative	A story which follows the journey of a refugee, travelling from one place to another: a migration story.	
Diary entry	A recount that shows the thoughts, feelings and opinions of a writer about a certain day/event.
