The children in Year 2 are learning about the Great Fire of London this half term. For this term's project, the children should choose from the activities below. **They should aim to complete at least 3 pieces.**



<p>Writing</p>	<p><u>News report</u> Pretend you are a news reporter in 1666. Write a newspaper report. This could be handwritten or typed on the computer. Remember to make your newspaper report look old!</p>	<p><u>Diary</u> Samuel Pepys was famous for keeping a diary during the fire. Imagine you lived in London in 1666. Write a diary about the fire, describing what it was like to be caught up in the event.</p>	<p><u>Poem</u> Write and illustrate a poem inspired by 'The Great Fire of London'.</p>
<p>Research</p>	<p><u>Research</u> Research the plague and the great fire using the internet or books. Hand write or type up your <u>findings in your own words</u> using Microsoft Word or other word processing packages. You may wish to add pictures downloaded from the internet (with support from an adult).</p>	<p><u>Map</u> Create a map of London in 1666 showing the location of the River Thames, Pudding Lane bakery and where the fire spread. This could be drawn or collaged. Alternatively, you could create a 3D map with miniature buildings e.g. Houses of Parliament, Pudding Lane bakery etc.</p>	<p><u>Character Study</u> Find out about important people from this famous event - for example Samuel Pepys, the mayor, Elizabeth Pepys, King Charles. Choose how to present your findings.</p>
<p>Creative</p>	<p><u>Buildings</u> Make a model of a church or house in London in 1666.</p>	<p><u>FIRE!</u> Create or reproduce a picture depicting a scene from London during the great fire. You could draw, paint, collage, use chalks or use a computer paint package to create your picture.</p>	<p><u>New London</u> Make a model or drawing to show how you would have redesigned the city following the Great Fire.</p>
