





How to Write your Signature

Here are some famous people's signatures:



- Your signature is a special mark that you can write in a style that is hard to copy. When you are older, you will use your signature to sign official documents like your passport or driving licence.
- 2. Look at the letters in your name and think about any that you can exaggerate or decorate:
 - Ascenders (tall letters) and descenders (below the line) are good for looping and extending.
 - First and last letters can be made bigger and decorative and you can add swishes and swirls.
 - You could underline or circle your signature, write it at an angle or around in a curve, or it could just be your normal handwriting!
