COMMUNICATION & LANGUAGE

Articulate their ideas and thoughts in well-formed sentences.

Connect one idea or action to another using a range of connectives.

Engage in non-fiction books.

Participate in small group, class and one to-one discussions, offering their own ideas, using recently introduced vocabulary.

Express their ideas and feelings about their experiences using full sentences, including use of past, present and future tenses and making use of conjunctions, with modelling and support from their teacher.

Listen to and talk about selected nonfiction to develop a deep familiarity with new knowledge and vocabulary. Describe events in some detail.

Use talk to help work out problems and organise thinking and activities explain how things work and why they might happen.

Show resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge.

PHYSTCAL DEVELOPMENT

Read some letter groups that each represent one sound and say sounds for them. Read a few common exception words matched to Song of Sounds phonic programme. Read simple phrases and sentences made up of words with known letter-sound correspondences and, where necessary, a few exception words.

Re-read these books to build up their confidence in word reading, their fluency and

Demonstrate understanding of what has been read to them by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary. Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussion about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and during role play.

Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs. Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending


Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed.
