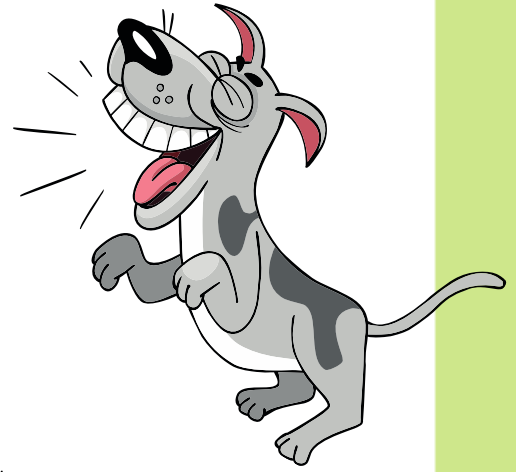

Speech marks

Speech marks – or inverted commas – go before and after the words someone says in a sentence. You need to punctuate your sentence with a comma, question mark or exclamation mark e.g.

“What’s your dog’s name?” asked David. “He’s called Mog,” replied Kim. “That’s a cat’s name!” exclaimed David.

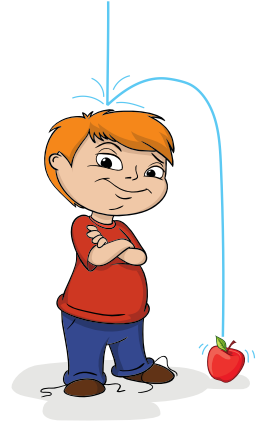

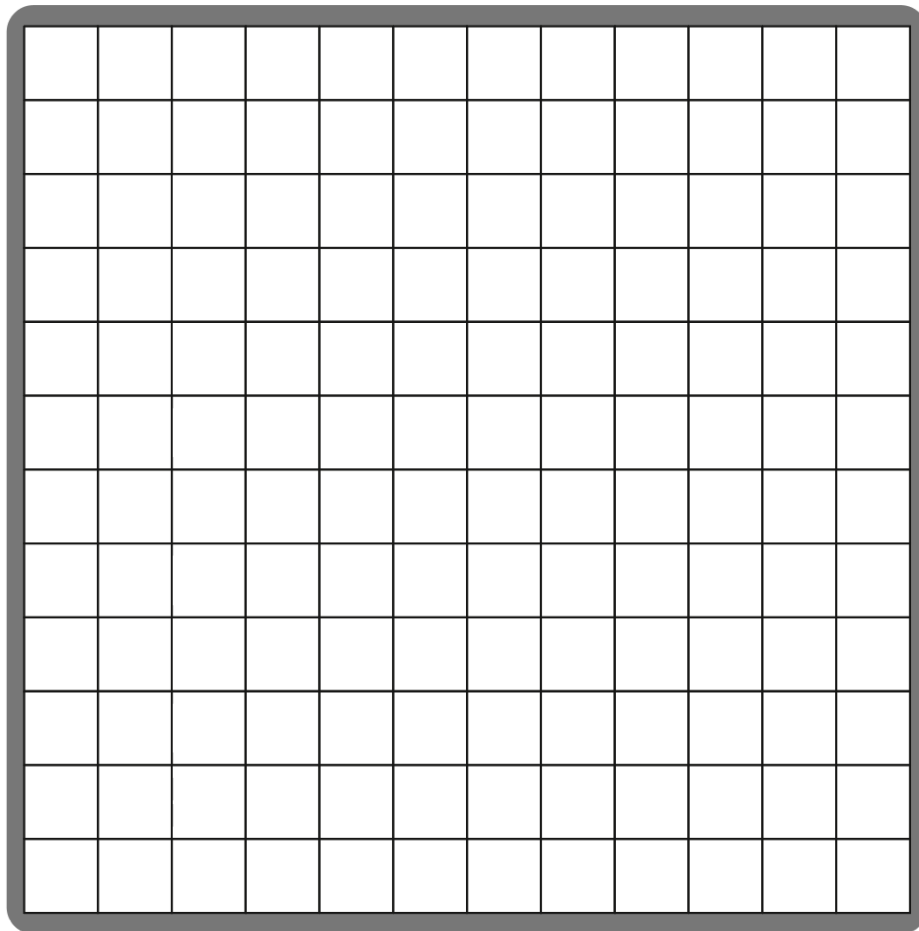
