



Hit the Button

Your child should spend 10 minutes daily on Hit the Button.

This can be accessed on any device and no login is required. The children should practice number bonds initially, then 2x, 5x tables

Maths Arithmetic Practice

Every two weeks we will send home a maths arithmetic homework with the aim of supporting your child in developing their skills. This will be alternated with a reading activity. (1 week maths, 1 week reading)

Reading

Please read with your child at home and support their comprehension strategies by asking questions about what they have read, ask them to make predictions, make inferences and discuss unknown vocabulary.


Reading Comprehension

Every two weeks we will also send home a reading comprehension activity, please support your child in completing this. This will be alternated with a maths activity. (1 week reading, 1 week maths)
