Florence Nightingale, also known as the 'Lady of the Lamp' is the founder of modern nursing. She worked to make hospitals safer and cleaner.

She saved the lives of many soldiers during the Crimean War (1854-1856).

Florence was awarded the Royal Red Cross medal by Queen Victoria.
