READING IN YEAR 2

We teach reading through:

- Phonics consolidate phase 5 through Little Wandle
 - Phase 5 (end of YI) assessment
 - Phase 5 review
 - Bridge to spelling
- Sharing books in school
- Weekly Pathways to Read lessons (Once we finish LW)
 - Links to our Pathways writing programme in school
- Sharing books at home

We strongly recommend that your child reads a book to an adult more than once - ideally FOUR times - before changing it to improve their fluency, pace, comprehension and inference skills.

READING IN YEAR 2

Children will have 2 reading books.

Phonics book: Read in school. Just like last year.

Non-decodable book: We no longer use Benchmarking in school. Children will be set book level that we seel is appropriate to support their comprehension development. It is recommended that children read this book 4 times before swapping it. Children will need to read this to an adult and should be questioned on it.

Reading for pleasure book: Children will choose a book from the school library that they would like to read. This book is to develop a love of reading and depending on the text may need to be read to them. Children will have library time where they will have to opportunity to change the book once it has been returned.

Reading Challenge

You will know your child is making progress in their reading if they are reading with greater accuracy and fluency, using expression and answering a growing range of questions that test their understanding.

READING IN YEAR 2

We all want to develop in our children a LOVE of reading

Enjoy stories together

Read a little and often — fluency is key (90 words per minute in Year 2 of an age-appropriate book)

Talk about the story before, during and afterwards. Discuss the plot, characters and encourage your child to have opinions

Look up definitions of words together and encourage your child to ask questions about words they don't understand

Year 2

Clarify vocabulary	Find words which tell you about the character/ setting. Can you think of another word for? Which word on this page means the same as?
Retrieve	Give one reason thathappens/ the character behaves this way. Tell me about your favourite part of the book. Explain why you like it. Why did? What did? Where did? When did? Which two? Do you think this book is trying to give the reader a message? What is it? Under which sub-heading, would I find information about
Summarise	Can you retell the story using one sentence per picture? What is this paragraph of information telling us? Sum up in one sentence.
Infer	How did (character) feel when?/ Why was (character) sad /happy? How do we know? What does this certain line tell us? Why is it important?
Predict	What does the cover/title/blurb make you think will happen? What is happening now? What happened before? What might happen next? Discuss the reasons for thinking this. Is this story similar to any others you have read or films you have seen? Are any characters like people you have met?
Structure and organisation	Find the labels, title, subheadings, diagram, contents page, information on How do these help us to read the text? Find three facts about Support your child to use the index and glossary.
Language choice	Find the words which tell us when things happen? Which words make this sound like a fairy story? What is your favourite word in the story, the poem, the information?

PHONICS SCREEN

- National assessment for Year I pupils in England which usually takes place in June
- · Test contains 40 words which are a combination of 'real' and 'fake' words
- Children will use phonics skills and knowledge they have learnt over Reception and Year I
 to decode and read words correctly
- Focus is to give teachers and parents information about how your child is progressing in phonics

How to help your child:

- Share a love of reading with your child: share books and magazines with your child, take
 them to the library to choose books and read to them.
- Read books every day—encourage them by pointing to the words and ask questions about
 the story and characters
- Practise reading key words and sounds in weekly spellings

WRITING IN YEAR 2

Write simple, coherent narratives

Write about real events

Use present and past tense correctly and consistently

Use co-ordination (and, but) and sub-ordination (if, that) to join clauses

Spell Common Exception Words Year I and 2 Common Exception Words

Use capital letters and full stops consistently and question marks when needed

Form all letters neatly - consistent sizing


Appropriate distance between letters and words

MATHS IN YEAR 2

- partition two digit numbers into tens and ones
- add 2 digit numbers within 100 and demonstrate working out
- use estimation to check their answers
- subtract mentally where no regrouping is required
- recognise inverse calculations and use to solve problems
- recall and use multiplication facts (2, 5, 10 tables)
- know and understand fractions to quarters and thirds
- use different coins to make the same amount
- read scales in divisions of ones, twos, fives and tens
- tell the time to the nearest 15 minutes
- describe properties of 2D and 3D shapes
- Mastering Number new programme we will be running from NCETM

HOMEWORK

- Reading every day at home with an adult and being read to
- Common Exception Words for Years I and 2 are available on our class pages
- · Optional menu of activities for each term will be on the class page



END OF KEY STAGE I TESTS

- Also known as SATs
- National assessment for Year 2 pupils now not statutory
- We plan to do the reading and maths papers towards to end of June.
 These will form part of the teacher assessment like we do in every year group.
- Focus on reading and maths
- Scaled score expected standard would be a scaled score of 100
