Neurodevelopmental Pathway Update: Autism, ADHD and Right to Choose

Many families across the country continue to face long waits and uncertainty when seeking autism and ADHD assessments for their children. Lancashire and South Cumbria Integrated Care Board (ICB) recognises the challenges this can bring and is working closely with NHS providers and local authority partners to improve the neurodevelopmental assessment pathway and create a better experience for children, young people and their families.



Latest Pathway Update

The ICB has released a new update about the Lancashire and South Cumbria Foundation Trust (LSCFT) Autism and ADHD Pathway affecting children and young people in some parts of Lancashire.

To help reduce waiting times, additional assessment capacity has been commissioned, creating more appointments for children and young people who are waiting for autism and ADHD assessments.

The ICB is also working closely with Lancashire and South Cumbria NHS Foundation Trust and Blackpool Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust to introduce new ways of delivering the service.

The aim is to make sure families get the right support at the right time, while continuing to improve the overall experience of the neurodevelopmental pathway.



Families do not need to take an action. If you have recently received correspondence from LSCFT, a dedicated set of Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs) is available to help explain what these changes mean for your family. New: Neu Way Support

Families across Lancashire and South Cumbria can now access Neu Way Support, a new service offering early help for children and young people aged 0 to 25 who may have autism, ADHD or other neurodevelopmental differences. The service is available based on need, meaning that you do not need a diagnosis or to be on an assessment waiting list to receive support.

Neu Way Support can provide:

- Advice and guidance
- Information about local services and support
- Practical resources and tools
- Help to identify next steps and develop a personalised plan
- Signposting to community, education, health and voluntary sector services

Every family's journey is different, so support is tailored to individual needs. Families can self-refer directly or be supported to access the service by a professional.

Understanding Right to Choose and Private Autism and ADHD assessments

Families registered with a GP in England may be able to access autism and ADHD assessments through an alternative NHS-approved provider using the NHS Right to Choose scheme.

This option may provide an alternative route to assessment, depending on individual circumstances and eligibility. If you are thinking about using Right to Choose, it is important to speak with your GP so you can fully understand the process and any implications for ongoing support or treatment.

The ICB has developed some advice and guidance, along with some FAQs, regarding what families should look out for when requesting a Right to Choose or private assessment, which can be found on the ICB's Neurodevelopmental Pathway webpage.

Spotlight on Lancashire's Teachers of D/deaf Children and Young People

Lancashire's specialist Teachers of D/deaf Children and Young People provide expert support to babies, children and young people with hearing loss from early years through to age 25 in education. They work closely with families, nurseries, schools and colleges to help children achieve their full potential.

The term '**Deaf**' (with a capital D) is used to refer to individuals who are born Deaf and identify as part of the Deaf community, while '**deaf**' (with a lowercase d) refers to those with hearing loss who primarily use spoken communication. Understanding these distinctions helps ensure that support is personalised and respectful of each child's identity and communication preferences.



The team offers specialist assessment, teaching and advice, supports the use of assistive listening technology, delivers deaf awareness training, and helps schools create inclusive learning environments. They also provide guidance to parent carers and run baby and toddler groups for D/deaf children.

Working alongside audiologists, speech and language therapists, educational psychologists and other professionals, the service ensures children and young people receive the right support at the right time. Referrals are made through audiology clinics, and support is available through SEN Support and Education, Health and Care Plans where appropriate.

This valuable service continues to make a positive difference to the lives of D/deaf children and young people across Lancashire, helping them participate, learn and thrive.

Right Support, Right Time, Right Place

From September 2026, **Experts at Hand** will bring specialist SEND expertise directly into schools, early years settings and post-16 providers across Lancashire. The new service will give education settings faster access to professionals such as educational psychologists, speech and language therapists, occupational therapists and specialist teachers, helping children and young people receive support earlier and closer to home.

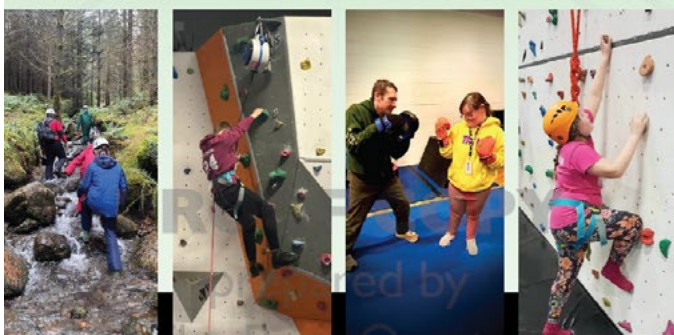
By making specialist advice, training and support more accessible, Experts at Hand aims to strengthen early intervention, improve collaboration between services and help children and young people get the right support at the right time.

Portage Home Visiting Service

Supporting your child's development at home

Portage is a free educational home-visiting service for young children with significant special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), from birth until they are eligible for funded childcare for 3-year-olds. The service is delivered by the Lancashire Specialist Teaching Service.

A specially trained Portage Home Visitor will work alongside you in your home, helping you support your child's play, learning and development. The service focuses on building your confidence and skills as a parent or carer, while helping your child make progress and achieve positive outcomes.

Who can access Portage?

Children from birth up to the age they become eligible for funded childcare for 3-year-olds who have significant special educational needs and disabilities may be able to access the service.

How to access the service

Parents and carers can refer their child directly to the Portage service using a referral form. For more information, please contact your local Inclusion Service Team. Children can also be referred with parental consent through an Early Help Assessment and Plan (EHA/EHP).

What happens after a referral?

Once a referral is received, it is reviewed to ensure the service is the right support for your child. Referrals are prioritised according to local guidance and factors such as safeguarding needs, current support arrangements, waiting times and the child's age.

Help us understand your child

When completing a referral, it is helpful to include information about:

- Your child's strengths and interests
- Things your child can already do independently
- Areas where they may need extra support
- Involvement from other professionals or services

This helps us gain a clear picture of your child's needs and determine the most appropriate support. Parental consent is required before a referral can be accepted.

Free Support for Children and Young People with Visual Impairment



Did you know that children and young people aged 0 to 25 with a visual impairment can access free low vision assessments and reading aids through local specialist services?

Both N-Vision and Galloways offer children's low vision services, helping young people make the most of their sight and build confidence and independence at home, in education, and in the community. Following an assessment, specialist low vision aids may be provided free of charge through NHS funding where appropriate.

The services support children and young people from birth up to age 25, and referrals can be made by anyone involved in their support, including parents and carers, schools, SENCOs and healthcare professionals. Families can also self-refer directly, meaning there is no need to go through a GP or eye consultant first.

FIND Database

The FIND database includes information about disabled children and young people up to 25 years old in Lancashire.

Families are invited to submit details about their disabled child or young person to the database, which is used to develop an overview of the needs of disabled children across the county to assist with planning services.

The FIND service is strictly confidential - no individual information about any children or their families is shared with anyone.
