What I should already know:

- -How people of different religions, such as Christianity and Judaism, show their beliefs.
- -That religious people have special celebrations to linked to their religious beliefs and that these celebrations have differences and similarities.
- -How and why people celebrate special times, like the Christian celebration of Christmas and the Jewish celebration of Rosh Hashanah.

Important Places: many religious people meet together at specific buildings to take part in collective prayer. Christians meet in Churches, Muslims meet in Mosques and Jewish people meet in Synagogues. This term, Year 3 will visit the Manchester Jewish Museum and see how Jewish people pray.







Key ideas to retain

- -Understand the similarities between how people of different faiths, such as Christian, Muslim and Jewish people pray.
- -What does it mean for Christian, Muslim and Jewish people to belong to a faith community.
- -What prayer is, how people pray and why it is important to people of faith to pray.
- -The meanings behind specific rituals and routines that people of different faiths follow when they pray.



Key Vocabulary

Prayer – A way that religious believers communicate with God.

Five Pillars of Islam – the five duties that all Muslims are expected to follow to live good lives and become closer to God.

The Lord's Prayer – the prayer that Christians believe Jesus taught his followers when they asked how they should pray.

The Shema – one of the most important parts of the Torah and a short prayer that Jewish people recite to declare their faith.

Kippah – a skull cap worn by Jewish men while they pray.

Ka'aba – a black building in Mecca, the birthplace of the Muslim Prophet Muhammad. Muslims face towards the Ka'aba while they pray.
