Information to parents about Private Fostering



What is Private Fostering?

Private fostering information for parents

What is Private Fostering?

Private Fostering is where your child under the age of 16 years (or under the age of 18 years old if disabled), and lives with a person who is not a close relative to them for 28 days or more.

Essentially, not many parents even know about private fostering. It is a private arrangement undertaken without the involvement of the

authorities; however, Children's Services must still be informed.

Private fostering occurs when someone who is not a close relative is caring for your child.

If however, your child is cared for by a close family member or person with parental responsibility, then the arrangement is not private fostering.



Why does Private Fostering happen?

From a parental point of view, you may need your child to be cared for several reasons, which could include:

- You and your child are in conflict/ have become estranged
- You are living abroad, away from your child
- You are going to be admitted to hospital for a long period of time
- You are going to, or are in prison
- Your child is being cared for by a host family as part of a football academy

It is important that there has been a conversation between yourself and the private foster carer, so they know why you want them to look after your child.

Your child's health and education need to be discussed, and agreements should be made as to what to do if your child becomes ill or has an injury. Any financial arrangements also need to be agreed between yourself and the private foster carer.

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What help and support is available?

What do you need to do?

The next steps would be to call Lancashire County Council - **0300 123 6720**
Blackpool Council - **01253 477299** Blackburn with Darwen Council - **01254 666400**
to register your situation and obtain further advice. It is a legal requirement to do so.

You will need to inform Children's Services about:

- Your child's name, date of birth, religion, racial origin and language(s) spoken
- The length of time expected for your child to stay with carers
- Names and address of both you and your child's carer
- The date the arrangement began, or the expected start date
- Previous addresses of the carer from the past five years
- Any previous convictions of the carer (having convictions does not mean the carer is prevented from privately fostering a child, but must be considered)
- If the carer has been disqualified from private fostering before
