Readings: Exodus 17:8-13, 2 Timothy 3:14-4:2, Luke 18:1-8.

With the edge of the sword, Joshua cut down Amalek and his people.

Not a very Godly action some might complain. But the Amalekites were preventing God's people from entering their God-given inheritance and, as such, were seen as enemies of God.

Victory, however, could only come about if Moses kept his arms raised which he does with the help of Aaron and Hur – quite a comical image, but the image conveys perseverance.

For, to be in constant communication with God, to be consciously aware of his presence at all times, to be in a state of continuous prayer especially petitionary prayer, requires perseverance and persistence such as we find in Jesus' parable of the persistent widow in today's Gospel.

Widows were among the marginalised who had no one to speak out for them against any injustice and so this widow makes up for it with her persistent cry for justice from a judge who, on his own admittance, had neither respect for God or man. The judge, unable to endure anymore, gives in and grants the widow her rights.

This leads Jesus to conclude that if the unjust judge can be beaten into submission by a widow's persistence, will not the all-good God see justice done to his chosen who cry to him day and night, even when he delays to help them.

We live with the frustration of delays throughout our lives whether bus, train or delays with our flights, or getting on this or that list, or delays in our medical appointment and surgery.

But whatever the delay is, we have to learn patient persistence in hope and faith and that is no less true in prayer – indeed the two go together for Jesus tells us to pray for **all** our needs.

In the end though, only God knows what those needs really are or whether or not to grant them and when; after all, a child may persistently demand all kinds of things but only those who truly love them know what is best for them because, in their love, they can see the bigger picture.

God our Father sees the bigger picture of our lives, but we still need to be as persistent as the widow in our prayers with the same confidence as Moses, that he hears them.

So, we must trust that God alone knows what is best for us even when he seems to delay or not grant even the most loving and caring of prayers.

We must persevere, so that when he comes, in whatever form that takes, he will find us faithful and persistent in prayer.

Reflection

To live without faith, without a heritage to defend, without battling constantly for truth, is not to live but to just 'get along'. We must never 'just get along'. (Bl. Pier Giorgio Frassati)

We must pray without ceasing, in every occurrence and employment of our lives, that prayer which is rather a habit of lifting up the heart to God as in a constant communication with him. (St Elizabeth Ann Seton)
