Key stage 2 tests

The statutory <u>key stage 2 tests</u> are timetabled from Monday 11 May to Thursday 14 May 2026.

There is no writing test (Teacher assessed only).

Results are released mid July.

Scaled score.

The range of scaled scores available for each KS2 test is the same as set in 2016 and is intended to stay the same in future years. The lowest scaled score that can be awarded on a KS2 test is 80. The highest scaled score is 120.

Pupils scoring at least a scaled score of 100 will have met the expected standard in the test.

A pupil awarded a scaled score of 99 or less has not met the expected standard in the test.

Writing assessment

There is no writing SATS. Instead, the work the children produce in their lessons will be used; my teacher assessment of them will be validated by external moderators.

This moderation process usually happens once every 4 years.



Within school, pupils are fully supported with my teaching, with purposeful intervention led by Mr Carlile or myself, support for certain students from Mrs Lowman, and revision little and often. We make the learning as fun as possible so the children retain what has been taught.
