

As well as celebrating the joy of dance, the story also explores the touching, intergenerational relationship between grandparent and child (who live together with no parents depicted or mentioned). Vibrant and vivacious.

Full of self-doubt, Femi wonders if she should hang up her football boots, but an elf gives her the encouragement she needs to believe in herself.

Cleverly interwoven with strands from familiar fairy tales, plus a rhyming text to give the story pace and rhythm.



Fun and energetic, starring a mixed-race family and two positive male role models in the dad and uncle.



When it transpires that Sally McSquawk doesn't actually lay eggs that talk, the narrator becomes suspicious. Have all the chickens been pretending about their various egg-citing creations, just to make a convenient rhyme?

A lovely, inventive book, with delightfully silly rhyming that rolls off the tongue.
