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P.S.H.E. Is taught both explicitly and discretely across the curriculum. This half term, the following statements from the P.S.H.E Association will be covered:	
H42. about the importance of keeping personal information private; strategies for keeping safe online, including how to manage requests for personal information or images of themselves and others; what to do if frightened or worried by something seen or read online and how to report concerns, inappropriate content and contact	
R6. that a feature of positive family life is caring relationships; about the different ways in which people care for one another	
R7. to recognise and respect that there are different types of family structure (including single parents, same-sex parents, step-parents, blended families, foster parents); that families of all types can give family members love, security and stability	
R8. to recognise other shared characteristics of healthy family life, including commitment, care, spending time together; being there for each other in times of difficulty	
R9. how to recognise if family relationships are making them feel unhappy or unsafe, and how to seek help or advice	
R11. what constitutes a positive healthy friendship (e.g. mutual respect, trust, truthfulness, loyalty, kindness, generosity, sharing interests and experiences, support with problems and difficulties); that the same principles apply to online friendships as to face-to-face relationships	
R22. about privacy and personal boundaries; what is appropriate in friendships and wider relationships (including online);	
R27. about keeping something confidential or secret, when this should (e.g. a birthday surprise that others will find out about) or should not be agreed to, and when it is right to break a confidence or share a secret
