Nursery	Use the muscles in their hands and arms to make big movements and bring together hand and eye movements to fix on and make contact with objects.  Engage in drawing freely in mark making activities. Sit and respond to a core text.  Retell a favourite story using the pictures and their memory, repeating words and phrases from familiar stories. To take part in pretend play, making up or developing a story.		Make random marks with their fingers and some tools.  Engage in a variety of ways to make marks e.g. making marks in dough/clay/sand.  Enjoy and recite learned rhyming words or alliterative phrases in familiar storybooks or nursery rhymes.  Retell a favourite story using the pictures and their memory.  Respond to the features of the story.		Mark make smaller and more controlled movements Draw lines and circles. Distinguish between these marks e.g. 'line, circle, zig zag' etc. Begin to use anticlockwise movements and retrace vertical lines. To look at their name card and attempt to write the letters. Remembering the rhyming words to familiar stories and rhymes. Take part in telling a story using props and a given structure with adult help or can create their own story of their day using a visual timetable. Become familiar with the way stories are structured.	
Reception	Write recognisable letters, including those in their names Join in Fred-talk. Answer simple questions, retell and sequence familiar stories with key vocabulary Introduced to non-fiction texts and poetry.		Developing coordination through bilateral activities and begin writing complex letter shapes and all the letters in their names. Gain confidence in writing words and short phrases, recognize letter groups representing sounds, and spell words by identifying and writing sounds.  Children blend sounds to read words and short stories, create their own stories, and anticipate key events.  Act out familiar and original stories, differentiate between fiction and non-fiction books.		Develop visual perception skills, such as writing in the correct place and recalling letters.  Write captions and early sentences with clear word spacing.  Retell and create their own stories using engaging language and are aware of their audience.  Discuss story settings, characters, and events, and use new vocabulary in their own storytelling. Identify non-fiction books, understand that they have content pages, and choose books to find specific facts without reading them in order.
