Meet the Teacher - Thank you to everyone who attended our 'Meet the Teacher' evening on Wednesday. If you were unable to join us, you should by now have received a copy of the presentation slides along with this term's Curriculum Newsletter. We encourage you to take a moment to read through these, as they outline key information about both the term ahead and the year as a whole.

Stay and Pray Sessions - You may have noticed the dates for our 'Stay and Pray' sessions on the school calendar. These are special opportunities to join your child in their classroom for a short, reflective prayer session of around 15 minutes. It's a calm and meaningful way to worship alongside your child. Year 6 will begin in a few weeks time, and parents are warmly invited (please check the calendar for exact dates). Simply wait outside your child's classroom door at drop-off, and you will be welcomed in once the register has been completed.

European Languages Day - On Friday 26th September, we will be celebrating European Languages Day. Children are invited to dress in the colours of the Spanish flag, and all classes will spend time exploring Spanish culture. We're looking forward to what promises to be a vibrant and enjoyable day.

Macmillan Coffee Morning - Also on Friday 26th September, we will be supporting Macmillan by hosting our annual Coffee Morning. 



Nursery

This week in Nursery, we have enjoyed listening to the story of the 3 Little Pigs.

We have loved meeting the characters especially the 'Big, Bad Wolf!'

Nursery have enjoyed lots of activities based on the story especially our class Tuff tray which was full of sticks, straw and bricks to explore and we used our imagination to retell the story.

In our Little Wandle phonics session, we have been singing the nursery rhyme 'Incy, Wincy Spider'. We can sing the rhyme with actions and recognises different sounds heard in the rhyme.

We have loved taking part in our class 'Yoga' session this week and have continued to enjoy lots of singing and dancing.

In our class Celebration of the Word this week, we listened to Miss Taylor's prayer, we watched carefully as Miss Taylor made the sign of the cross and began to do this ourselves.

Reception

What another great and busy week we've had in Reception! The children are really settling into our routines and are growing in confidence day by day.

In Literacy, we began our imitation week of our class story Monkey Puzzle. The children enjoyed following our story map with simple phrases and actions to help them remember the story. They then retold it using puppets and even had a go at ordering the events in more detail, using their new knowledge of sequencing.

In Maths, we have been sorting and comparing. You might like to have a go at this at home – do you have anything that is the same? Buttons, toy cars, Lego pieces? Can you sort them by size, colour, or even shape?

In RE, we continued learning about God's Wonderful World. We listened again to the Story of Creation from Genesis 1 and were able to sequence the order in which God made everything.

This week was also very special as we buddied up with our Year 6 friends. Mrs Artingstall planned a wonderful forest school session for us all to enjoy together – we are so excited for the year ahead with them!

Year One

Another week has flown by in Year One and the children are settling really well. In English, we continue our work on 'I can see' sentences, fixing errors such as capital letters and full stops and rewriting them correctly in our books.

In Maths, we have been counting backwards from 10 and finding and representing one less within 10.

In History, we started our topic on Monarchy and discussed what makes a good king or queen, as well as deciding what we would do if we were a Monarch.

In R.E, we looked at a Kennings Poem about God's creation and the children created their own artwork based on The Creation Story.

In Science, we labelled parts of the body and began to talk about our senses, focusing on sight.

We finished the week with a lovely Mass about friendship.

Year Two

We have had another fantastic week in Year 2. The children are continuing to impress us each day.

In English this week, we have continued o consolidate our grammar knowledge. We have been focusing on action and being verbs, and used these to write sentences about the story 'The Gruffalo's Child'

In Maths, we have continued to make two digit numbers up to 100 using concrete resources. We have also begun to flexibly partition numbers to 100.

We have been sequencing the events of the Great Fire of London in History, and exploring some artefacts and significant people alive during the time of the fire.

In RE, we have further explored stories from the Holy Bible. We learnt the Annunciation story of John the Baptist. The children worked hard to retell the story.

We ended the week with a beautiful friendship Mass where the children sang wonderfully.

Year Three

We have had another busy week in Year 3. In Maths this week we have been focusing on place value to 1,000. We have been using number lines to help us order numbers and using apparatus such as place value counters and base 10 to visually represent 3 digit numbers. Finally, we used place value counters to help us add and subtract 1, 10 and 100 from 3 digit numbers. In Science, we are continuing our lessons on the skeleton by looking and different types of skeletons, such as the skeletons of animals and fish, to compare and contrast them to our own. In English we have been continuing to investigate different types of nouns, such as common nouns, proper nouns and collective nouns. Year 3 were also very excited to start our singing lessons this week with Miss Dalledone, our new singing teacher.

Year Four

The end of a very busy week in Year 4. The children have really enjoyed learning about Ancient Egyptian society and the hierarchy which existed at that time. They wrote an advert asking for tomb builders, scribes or craftsmen to apply for jobs. In English we have worked on simple and compound sentences based on our knowledge of the Egyptians. In Maths we have continued to look at Place Value, partitioning 4 digit numbers in different ways and placing numbers on a numberline. The children have been working hard to recall their 3 times table. In Science we have begun our first unit on Living Things, distinguishing between vertebrates and invertebrates.

Year Five

The Year 5 children have had a fantastic week of learning! In Maths, we have continued our place value unit, focusing on finding 10, 100, and 1,000 more or less than five-digit numbers, as well as exploring different ways to partition numbers. In English, the children have been practising the key skills needed to build strong sentences and have been working hard to write accurately when sentences are dictated. In Religion, we have been learning about covenants, exploring Old Testament stories and the special promises made between God and His people. Our History lessons have taken us deeper into the world of the Maya, where the children have been investigating their writing system and examining different logograms. Finally, it was wonderful to see so many of you at the Meet the Teacher presentation—we hope you found it informative.

Year Six

We have had a brilliant week here in Year 6 getting stuck into the curriculum! This week, we concluded our Place Value unit with a focus on negative numbers, using a bridging method to deepen our understanding. We have also begun our new unit on Addition and Subtraction, where we are developing confidence with formal written methods.

In English, our learning has centred around different types of nouns — common, proper, collective, partitive, and abstract — which we then applied in a short burst writing piece to strengthen our grammar and writing skills. The children have worked extremely hard with this and have begun to access challenge questions in a SATS format to support their understanding.

In RE, we explored key Bible stories, including those of Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Joseph, and Moses, comparing their journeys and reflecting on how God fulfilled His Covenant to each of them.

A highlight of the week was meeting our special friends and enjoying a fantastic Forest School session with Mrs Artingstall. The children thoroughly enjoyed the experience and are excited to reunite for Mass next week.
