
Caritas Award


Wednesday 8th October 2025

THE GOSPEL IN CHURCH Sunday 12th October 2025

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus travelled along the border between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered one of the villages, ten lepers came to meet him. They stood some way

off and called to him, "Jesus! Master!

Take pity on us." When he saw them he said, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." Now, as they were going away, they were cleansed. Finding himself cured, one of them turned back praising God at the top of his voice and threw himself at the feet of Jesus and thanked him. The man was a Samaritan. This made Jesus say, "Were not all ten made clean? The other nine, where are they? It seems that no one has come back to give praise to God, except this foreigner." And he said to the man, "Stand up and go on your way. Your faith has saved you."



Dear Lord Jesus, thank you for blessing us in so many ways. Help us to be always thankful to you and to show our thankfulness by loving those around us. Amen.



Nursery

This week in Nursery we have enjoyed singing our rhyme of the week 'Humpty Dumpty' we have loved creating actions for this rhyme, listening to different sounds from the rhyme and clapping syllables of words in the rhyme.

We are also working hard to listen to the initial sound in our own names.

Our Maths focus this week has been matching.

We have made comparisons between objects using size, colour and shape. We have also enjoyed singing our Math's focus song `5 Little Speckled Frogs.' On Wednesday we took part in our weekly Story makers session with Tameside Library, we enjoyed dancing, listening to a story and taking part in a dough disco! In our weekly Celebration of the Word session this week, we continued to look at the special items on our class altar.

We know that a bible is a Special book with stories of Jesus in it. We enjoyed singing our special songs 'Magic Penny' and 'If I were a Butterfly'.

We are working very hard to learn our morning and dinnertime prayers.

Reception

What a bright and bubbly week we've had in Reception! The classroom has been filled with smiles and sunshine as we celebrated Yellow Day — thank you to everyone for dressing up so brilliantly in yellow!

In celebration of the word this week we talked about the importance of saying "thank you" and when we can use kind words to show appreciation, linking this to our school value of respect. In Literacy, we continued enjoying our class book *My Grandpa*, thinking about the special relationship between grandparents and grandchildren. The children are doing a fantastic job recalling parts of the story and talking about their favourite moments. A big thank you to everyone who sent in those lovely family photos for our next RE lesson — they will look wonderful in our classroom photo album.

In Phonics, we learned our new sounds h, b, f, and l, and the children are becoming much more confident at blending and spotting these sounds in words. In Maths, we explored repeated patterns and learned new vocabulary such as *repeat*, *next*, and *continue*. The children even took their learning outside to hunt for real-life patterns in the playground! It's been a week full of fun, learning, and bright yellow happiness — we're so proud of how enthusiastic and curious the children have been.

Year One

It's been another jam-packed week in Year 1!

Our highlight of the week was our walk to Droylsden Library on Tuesday. The children enjoyed looking at the books, and they received compliments from the librarian about their excellent behaviour.

In R.E we have been learning Pope Francis' message of Laudato Si. We have created pledges about how we can look after our common home, the earth.

In English, we have continued to write our 'I like it when' sentences with increased independence.

In Maths, we have been looking at fact families and number bonds within 10.

In History, we learnt about who Queen Victoria was and completed a guiz about her.

With Mrs Nourine in Science, the children participated in a food tasting activity whilst learning about senses.

We ended the week with a beautiful Mass and Hello Yellow day!

Year Two

Yet another busy week in Year 2!

In Maths, we estimated on a numberline before comparing and ordering objects and numbers. We also counted in 2s, 5s and 10s, exploring and identifying patterns and making generalisations.

In English this week, we planned and wrote recipe poems for the Young Writers' competition. Those selected will be published in the next book. As part of our grammar work, we wrote dictated sentences, ensuring they were punctuated correctly and included the spellings we have practised in Phonics. The children also punctuated paragraphs, identifying simple sentences and adding capital letters and full stops.

RE this week has focused on stewardship. The children wrote poems about God's creation and identified actions which can help and harm the Earth, before pledging to be stewards for God's creation.

Finally, we enjoyed a fun-filled and enriching trip to Droylsden Library. The children learnt about all the different areas of the library, explored different authors and genres of books and selected books of their own to take home. It has been particularly rewarding to hear that many children have already planned their next visit to the library with their family.

Ouestion: How can we be stewards for God's creation?

Year Three

This week in Maths, we began a new unit of learning addition and subtraction. We added ones and tens to hundreds using tens frame and place value charts to support our answers.

In English this week, we have been focusing on single clause sentences. Children identified the subject and the verb in several sentences. They also completed a task using the correct punctuation in each sentence.

For RE this week, we have explained what it means to be made in the image and likeness of God. Children discussed how we are all in God's image but we are all unique. Children displayed ways of showing God's image, some of our examples were by using kind words and showing love to our family.

3LH enjoyed a trip to Droylsden Library and both classes took part in a poetry in motion workshop from a theatre company. The children thoroughly enjoyed hearing familiar poems being performed.

Question: How did the stone age people survive?

Year Four

This week has flown by. The children have worked very hard.

Perhaps the highlight was the 'Poetry in Motion' performance which we enjoyed on Wednesday. It was great to see so many well-known poems performed in a fun and engaging way.

In History this week we began to look at the lives of Cleopatra and Tutankhamun, thinking about why they are such significant historical figures. In RE, we looked at a canticle written by St Francis of Assisi which we compared to the story of God's Creation.

In Maths we have begun to look at adding and subtracting 3 digit numbers, initially without exchanges. In one of our PE sessions we have been exploring movement linked to an Egyptian theme. The children did a great job of inventing poses to match Egyptian vocabulary.

Question: Why did St Francis call the moon his sister?

Year Five

Another fantastic week for Year 5!

In Maths the children have started their next block of work on Addition and Subtraction. They are currently revisiting the column method and securing their knowledge of exchanges. In English the children have been forming their own compound sentences based on their knowledge of the ancient Maya. In History we learnt about the Mayan game of Pok-ta-Pok and the myths and facts surrounding it. We looked to see if there were an similarities to any of the sports we play today, and found out they still play Pok-ta-Pok and even have a World Championship.

The children also had a special visit from 'Poetry in Motion' and enjoyed hearing a mix of old and new poems.

When did the Mayans first start to play Pok-ta-Pok?

Year Six

Year Six have continued to work incredibly hard this week in all areas of the curriculum! In Maths, we have been looking at division and how we interpret and display remainders. This has been through using the short division method, with next week being the start of our recap on long division! The children particularly loved the challenge presented in their "Pathways" activity on Thursday.

In English, we have been looking at compound and complex sentences, including the use of conjunctions to extend and uplevel our writing. This will allow us to produce more engaging pieces of writing with varied sentence types throughout.

In R.E., we focused on the Ten Commandments. Firstly, this involved interpreting what they actually mean. We then moved on to rewording them so that the meaning remained in place but they were worded more positively in line with our school rules.

We also started our World War Two unit in History, exploring the reasons that the war started and how Adolf Hitler came to power. The children have produced some excellent letters from the perspective of German citizens.
