



1 Enjoy reading this Sunday's Gospel


Jesus wanted to teach his disciples that they should always pray and never give up. So he told them a story. Jesus said, "There was a judge in a certain town who had neither fear of God nor respect for any other person. In the same town

there was a widow who kept on coming to him and saying, 'I want justice from you against my enemy!' For a long time the judge refused, but at last he said to himself, 'Maybe I have neither fear of God nor respect for any other person, but since she keeps pestering me I must give this widow her just rights, or she will continue coming and worry me to death.'" Then Jesus said, "If even the unjust judge eventually helped this woman who didn't give up, then how much more will God, who is good, help those who pray to him every day."

Wednesday's Word

PRAYER



"Prayer brings us not only nearer to God but also nearer to one another." Pope Benedict XVI

What was Jesus teaching his disciples? In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus tells us that God is not like the unjust judge who is irritated by the woman pestering him. No matter how much we pray to God, he doesn't think we are pestering him - he is our loving Father. There are many kinds of prayer. This Gospel reminds us about the value of 'Asking Prayer' and not giving up in our prayer requests. Ask your child what the word 'prayer' means to them. Does your child like to pray aloud or quietly, alone or with others? What is their favourite prayer?

Prayer, at its simplest, is spending time with God - talking, listening, being together - telling God all about our lives. We can trust that God always hears our prayers and will always do what is best for us and those we pray for. We can pray anywhere, anytime. Each of you say when and where you like to pray (e.g. at home, in bed, at church, at school, outside, elsewhere). What would you like to pray and ask God for this week? Who can you pray for throughout the coming week (e.g. a family member, a friend, your teacher, your priest, a poorly, hungry or lonely person)? How else can you help that person?

Nursery

This week in Nursery we have loved our phonics rhyme of the week 'The Grand Old Duke of York.' (This has been our favourite of the term so far!) In Maths we have continued our work on Matching.

We have made comparisons between objects according to size and compared sizes using mathematical language.

We have loved exploring the season of 'Autumn' this week, looking at seasonal photographs and exploring our Autumn Tuff Tray with pumpkins, leaves, acorn, conkers and animals such as Squirrels, Hedgehogs and Foxes.

In our focused RE sessions this week we continued our learning of making the sign of the cross. We have been respectful during our Prayer times in class.

We have loved sharing your videos and photographs of our Nursery children saying their morning prayers- Thank you.

We have also had great fun outdoors as always, enjoying parachute games, exploring the adventure playground and planting daffodil bulbs, onions, and green beans with Mrs Artingstall.

Reception

We've had a wonderful week in Reception, packed with learning, laughter and lots of thankfulness!

The children have enjoyed exploring the early stages of subitising – recognising small numbers (1 to 3) without counting – through fun games and hands-on activities. We've also been practising repeating patterns using our bodies – think stars, circles, diamonds – which brought plenty of giggles along the way! In class worship, we've taken time to thank God for all sorts of things, from our families and pets to our favourite toys. One of our highlights this week was listening to a lovely story about "My Grandpa", which sparked lots of warm and thoughtful conversations.

A big well done to all our Reception stars!

Year One

What a lovely week we've had in Year 1!

In Maths, we have been continuing our work on addition and subtraction. The children have been solving word problems and finding missing numbers by working out the missing part. They have shown great focus and problem-solving skills. In English, we finished our writing unit by creating "I like it when..." sentences. The children worked hard to write independently and share their thoughtful and imaginative ideas. In R.E., we talked about how we can care for others and look after our common home, learning about Pope Francis' message from *Laudato Si*'. The children had some excellent suggestions about how we can all make a difference. In History, we learnt about Queen Elizabeth I and had fun putting British monarchs in the correct order. The children enjoyed discussing what made each monarch unique. This week, the children have also been completing their phonics assessments and will receive a new reading book level after the half term.

Year Two

We have had a lovely week in Year 2.

In RE this week, we have been considering what it means to 'walk with God', and wrote our own promise of hope. We also have begun to explore the Sacrament of Baptism, and what it means to be welcomed into the Christian family.

We have been completing our place value unit in Maths by counting in 2s, 5s and 10s, and we are now revising Year 1 addition methods ready for Year 2 addition and subtraction.

In English, we have been learning about coordinating conjunctions, and how to use 'and' 'but' or 'so' in our writing to join two clauses together. The children are working really hard with this.

In History, to celebrate Black History month, we have been learning about the very inspirational woman, Harriet Tubman. The children have created some beautiful pieces of artwork of doves, representing freedom.

We brought our week to an end with a beautiful Celebration of the Word about gratitude.

Year Three

It has been another busy and enjoyable week in Year 3. On Tuesday, both classes enjoyed their first Forest School session of the year themed around how to survive during the Stone Age! In our history lessons, we looked at the positive impact farming had on life during the late Stone Age.

In English, we have started our work on compound sentences. We identified the subject, verb and coordinating conjunction in a range of compound sentences. In RE, we thought about what it means to be made in the image and likeness of God, whilst at the same time celebrating how unique we are. We linked this to human dignity and thought about how we could show human dignity both at home and at school.

In Science, we have been looking at different types of joints, such as the hinge joints at our elbows and knees and ball & socket joints at our shoulders!

Year Four

This week in Year 4 we have been working hard in our Religious Education lessons. The children thought about what it was like to be made in God's image. In our subsequent lesson we thought about human dignity and how every person deserves to be treated with respect no matter who they are.

In Maths this week we have practised adding three digit numbers exchanging ones with tens and tens with hundreds. In English the children have planned and written a text about Tutankhamun using all the sentences types which we have practised. In Spanish, we have continued with our lessons on the seasons, making simple sentences about winter. In Science we have progressed in our unit about living things by learning about classification. In PE we continued with our work on movement based on Egyptian motifs but this time the children had to move around at different levels.

Year Five

We've had a fantastic week in Year 5! In English, we have been exploring the structure of complex sentences and using this knowledge to write our own. We are now applying what we've learned about different sentence types to build longer, more detailed paragraphs. In Maths, we continued our work on addition and subtraction, focusing on using the inverse operation to check our answers. We also applied the RUCSAC strategy to tackle multi-step word problems with great success. In Religion, we have been reflecting on the Ten Commandments and rewriting them in a more positive and proactive way. 5LS have been making wonderful progress in their Cornet lessons — they are now beginning to read music and play with growing confidence. Keep practising! A big well done to 5CP, who presented a fantastic class assembly showcasing all the brilliant learning and achievements from this year.

Year Six

Year 6 have had a fantastic week of learning! In English, the children have been focusing on using relative clauses in their writing, creating thoughtful sentences inspired by the short film *Beyond the Lines*. This linked perfectly with the introduction of our new History topic on World War II, which has captured their interest and sparked some brilliant discussions. They have also been working hard on their modelled planning and writing of a recount, and we are excited to see them continue this work independently next week as they write about the next key events.

In Maths, the children have been tackling long division. Although they initially found this challenging, they have shown great resilience and determination, successfully completing calculations with remainders and even expressing these as fractions. We are incredibly proud of their perseverance and progress. Next week, we'll be moving on to master multi-step problems.

In History, Year 6 have been exploring what school life was like during World War II compared to today. They have deepened their understanding of children's experiences through studying evacuation and analysing bias in historical sources. Their curiosity and hard work have been impressive – well done, Year 6!
