It has been a great first week back, despite the very cold weather. We began the week by reflecting on the Feast of the Epiphany. In class, children also revisited our school rules, values and mission, and discussed what it means to be part of the St Stephen's family. The children have settled back into their routines extremely well. It has also been great to see children move into their new classrooms. There has been a buzz of excitement around school which we love! We have also been delighted to welcome many new children to our school. They have settled in beautifully, and it has been lovely to see them exploring their new environment. A very warm welcome to our new families.

A reminder to ensure you apply for your child's Reception class place by 15th January — please spread the word.

Today, we attended Mass together as a school, which was a lovely celebration and a wonderful way to begin the new term and celebrate the Feast of St Stephen's.

A few gentle reminders:

- Please ensure your child's name is clearly labelled on all uniform items to avoid lost property.
- Hair below shoulder length must be tied back.
- School shirts and ties must be worn by children in Years 1–6. School ties are part of the uniform and can be purchased via ParentPay and collected from the school office.
- Nail polish and make-up are not permitted.
- Bracelets, rings and hoop earrings should not be worn.
- Watches may be worn; however, smart watches are not permitted.
- Footwear should be plain black shoes.
- As the weather changes, please ensure your child has a waterproof coat. Children may also bring a pair of spare trainers to change into for lunchtime and playtimes if they wish.
- PE kits should consist of a royal blue polo shirt and navy bottoms if the school-branded kit has not been purchased.

We have noticed an increase in children arriving late to school or being collected early. Where possible, please try to arrange appointments outside of school hours. We appreciate that this can sometimes be difficult. Also, as the office is now located at the top of the school, please be patient when waiting for your child to come across.

Finally, please take note of the term calendar dates on the next page. Thank you, as always, for your continued support and best wishes for the new year ahead.

Nursery

Welcome back to Spring term 1 in Nursery.

This term our Main Topic focus is Transport and we will learn all about the story 'Naughty Bus' and the journey that the Red bus takes. We will create a story map of the text as a class using our Talk for Writing learning.

We will learn that-

1. Vehicles can be sorted by how they move (land, air and water)
2. Vehicles carry people or objects to different places.
3. Vehicles make different sounds and move in different ways.
4. Vehicles help people and things to get from one place to another.

We will also be learning all about Winter, we will learn all about the weather, the animals that live in cold environments and how to stay safe in the cold weather.

This week we have loved activities that are strengthening our fine and gross motor skills, we have enjoyed taking part in our daily dough dances, practiced our pencil grasp and control and taken part in dance and movement sessions using our arms to create lots of different movements and shapes.

In Phonics this week we have loved singing the rhyme 'The Wheels on the Bus' and in Maths we have focused on the 'Number 3 and Subitising'.

In RE, we focused on the Wise Men's visit to Baby Jesus (Matthew 2:1–12).

We know that they brought him gifts because he was special and that they followed the star to find Baby Jesus.

Reception

WOW! What a lovely first week back we have had! It has been wonderful to welcome all of our little superstars back to school after the Christmas break. The children have settled back into routines beautifully and have been full of enthusiasm, smiles and excitement as we started our new learning together.

In Literacy, we began our new class text The Train Ride. The children enjoyed exploring the story, talking about the different places the train travels through and sharing their own ideas and observations. We have started to develop our speaking and listening skills by describing what we can see and making links to our own experiences.

In Maths, we have started learning about the composition of 5. The children have been exploring different ways to make 5 using practical resources, counting carefully and beginning to explain their thinking.

In RE, we marked St Stephen's Feast Day, learning about our patron saint and why he is important to our school community. We also began our new branch, Galilee to Jerusalem, where the children are starting to learn more about Jesus' life and journey.

We are so proud of how well the children have returned to school and the positive attitude they have shown towards their learning this week. Thank you, as always, for your continued support.

Year One

A fantastic first week back in Year 1, enjoying our new classrooms.

This week, we began our new English book *Unplugged* and completed activities focusing on maintaining the past tense.

In Maths, we worked on counting to 20 and back, as well as developing our understanding of 10. In R.E., we learned about the Epiphany and listened to the *Noisy Christmas* story. In Geography, we completed a check-out task based on our recent unit about the United Kingdom. During PSHE, we talked about people we trust. We ended the week by coming together for Mass.

Year Two

A wonderful first week back has been enjoyed by all in Year 2. The children have settled well into their new routines and 2LW are loving their new classroom.

This week, in English, we began our unit of work on '*Lizzie and the Birds*' by Dawn and Mick Robertson. We identified verbs and explored their tense, focussing on spelling patterns for past and present tense action verbs.

In Maths, the children identified and sorted 2d and 3d shapes, comparing sides and vertices and recognising relationships. They also investigated lines of symmetry.

On Tuesday, we celebrated the feast of St Stephen, which is celebrated on 26th December each year. We also sequenced the events of the Epiphany and the meaning behind the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.

Finally, in History, we learned about the Suffragettes and their importance in fighting for women's rights and equality.

Year Three

It has been lovely to welcome the children back after the Christmas break and they have settled back into school routines wonderfully. This week we have celebrated our school's patron saint, St. Stephen, and produced a lovely piece of work which described St. Stephen's qualities. In RE, we read scripture from Matthew's Gospel about the Epiphany, and re-told the story of the Magi worshipping baby Jesus in the form of a Wanted poster from King Herod's point of view.

In Maths, we have started a new unit of work on angles. We learnt that an angle was a measure of a turn, and we looked at the difference between clockwise and anticlockwise. We also studied right angles, and enjoyed finding examples of right angles in our classroom environment. In PHSE, we thought about the importance of saying sorry when we have done something wrong. We described a time when we said sorry to someone and described how we felt after we said sorry. Today we ended our busy first week back by taking part in our first whole school mass of 2026.

Year Four

The children have settled really well into their classroom routine and have begun to engage well with their new learning.

They have taken in particular to our new English text: 'The Legend of Rock, Paper, Scissors.' They enjoyed writing some dialogue between the characters and then acting out their ideas. We completed our Geography unit on Spain by looking at Spanish culture and exploring why it is so appealing to tourists. This week we recalled and practised the 11 times table.

The children are showing great improvement in their times table recall.

In RE, we remembered the Feast of St Stephen on 26th December by reading about his life and understanding why he is called the First Martyr. We also marked the Epiphany of Our Lord by reading the story of the Magi and thinking about what gifts we ourselves could bring to Jesus. It was lovely to be part of our whole school mass today.

Year Five

Happy New Year and a very warm welcome back to all our children and families! The children have settled back into school life beautifully and are already engaging enthusiastically in their learning.

In English, we have started reading *The Right to Learn*—Malala Yousafzai's inspiring story—and we are excited to begin our new English unit based on it next week. In Maths, the children have been exploring multiplication, focusing on partitioning and developing an understanding of the term *partial product*. In Religion, we have been learning about the life of St Stephen and reflecting on the Epiphany, thinking deeply about the symbolism of the gifts and the Magi's expectations of Jesus. On Thursday, we were fortunate to take part in a

Show Racism the Red Card workshop, where the children were thoroughly engaged and learned valuable ways to stand up against racism. We ended the week by attending our first whole-school Mass of 2026. The children were, as always, respectful, joined in beautifully with the responses, and sang wonderfully throughout.

Year Six

What a fantastic time to be a part of Year 6! Our new classrooms are incredible and we feel extremely lucky to be in our shiny, new surroundings. The children have adapted well to the new settings and have already settled in.

In Maths, we have been concentrating on multiplying and dividing fractions. This has involved calculations with two fractions as well as problems with a fraction and an integer. We have been really impressed with how much the children have remembered over the Christmas holiday, which has made for a smooth transition.

Our English work has moved on to Romeo and Juliet. This is always a very enjoyable unit, with a dramatic and well-known tale. We have been focusing on using active and passive voice, along with using expanded noun phrases effectively to set the scene and convey emotions in our writing.

As the Feast of St. Stephen was during the Christmas break, our first R.E. lesson was to learn more about the patron saint of our school. We then moved on to The Epiphany, with a specific focus on why the wise men chose the gifts of gold, frankincense and myrrh.
