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	Develop their communication but may continue to have problems with irregular tenses and plurals, such as 'runned' for 'ran', 'swimmed' for 'swam'. Develop their pronunciation but may have problems saying: · some sounds: r, j, th, ch, and sh · multi-syllabic words such as 'pterodactyl', 'planetarium' or 'hippopotamus'.  Start a conversation with an adult or a friend and continue it for many turns.
Physical Development	Get Set 4 PE - Introduction to PE Unit 1 Continue to develop their movement, balancing, riding (scooters, trikes and bikes) and ball skills.  Use large-muscle movements to wave flags and streamers, paint and make marks.  Match their developing physical skills to tasks and activities in the setting. For example, they decide whether to crawl, walk or run across a plank, depending on its length and width.  Use one-handed tools and equipment, for example, making snips in paper with scissors.


Engage in extended conversations about stories, learning new vocabulary.

## Mathematics



Develop fast recognition of up to 3 objects, without having to count them individually ('subitising'). Recite numbers past 5. Say one number for each item in order: 1,2,3,4,5.



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	Talk about and explore 2D and 3D shapes (for example, circles, rectangles, triangles and cuboids) using informal and mathematical language: 'sides', 'corners'; 'straight', 'flat', 'round'.  Make comparisons between objects relating to size, length, weight and capacity.  Talk about and identify the patterns around them. For example: stripes on clothes, designs on rugs and wallpaper. Use informal language like 'pointy', 'spotty', 'blobs', etc.
Understanding the World	Use all their senses in hands-on exploration of natural materials. Explore collections of materials with similar and/or different properties. Talk about what they see, using a wide vocabulary.  Weekly visits to the school field, garden and Forest School area  Talk about the differences between materials and changes they notice.
Expressive Arts and Design	Take part in simple pretend play, using an object to represent something else even though they are not similar.  Begin to develop complex stories using small world equipment like animal sets, dolls and dolls houses, etc.  Make imaginative and complex 'small worlds' with blocks and construction kits, such as a city with different buildings and a park.  Create closed shapes with continuous lines and begin to use these shapes to represent objects.  Listen with increased attention to sounds.  Respond to what they have heard, expressing their thoughts and feelings.  Remember and sing entire songs.
