Definition of Special Educational Needs and Disability (SEND) taken from the Children's and Families Act 2014.

1. Vision Statement

Under the Equality Act 2010, schools should have an Accessibility Plan. The Equality Act 2010 replaced all existing equality legislation, including the Disability Discrimination Act. The effect of the law is the same as in the past, meaning that 'schools cannot unlawfully discriminate against pupils because of sex, race, disability, religion or belief and sexual orientation'. According to the Equality Act 2010, a person has a disability of:

- a) They have a physical impairment, and
- b) The impairment has a substantial and long-term adverse effect on their ability to carry out normal day-to-day activities

The Accessibility Plan is listed as a statutory document of the Department for Education's guidance on statutory policies for schools. The Plan must be reviewed every **three** years and approved by the Governing Body, an individual or the Head.

At Dene House Primary School, our values reflect our commitment to a school where there are high expectations of everyone. Children are provided with high quality learning opportunities so that each child attains and achieves all that they are able to. Everyone in our school is important and included. We promote an ethos of care and trust where everyone is valued and has a sense of belonging. We work hard to ensure that all children feel seen and believe that all children should feel safe, happy and valued.

1. The Accessibility Plan is drawn up in compliance with current legislation. The Governing Body are accountable for ensuring the implementation, review and reporting of progress of the Accessibility Plan over its duration. The intention is to provide a projected plan for a 3 year period ahead of the next review date.
2. The Accessibility Plan is structured to compliment and support the school's Equality Objectives, and will similarly be published on the school website. We understand that the Local Authority will monitor the school's activity under the Equality Act 2010 (and in particular, Schedule 10 regarding Accessibility) and will advise upon the compliance with that duty.
3. Dene House Primary School is committed to providing an environment that enables full curriculum access that values and includes all pupils, staff, parents, carers and visitors regardless of their education, physical, sensory, social, spiritual, emotional and cultural needs. We are committed to taking positive action in the spirit of the Equality Act 2010 with regard to disability and to developing a culture of inclusion, support and awareness within the school.

4. The Dene House Primary School Accessibility Plan shows how access is to be improved for disabled pupils, staff and visitors to the school within a given timeframe and anticipating the need to make reasonable adjustments to accommodate their needs where practicable.

The Accessibility Plan contains relevant and timely actions to:

- Increase access to the curriculum for all pupils with a disability, expanding the **curriculum** as necessary to ensure that pupils with a disability are as, equally, prepared for life as are the able-bodied pupils; (If a school fails to do this then they are in breach of their duties under the Equalities Act 2010); this covers teaching and learning and the wider curriculum of the school such as participation in after-school clubs, leisure and cultural activities or schools visits – it also covers the provision of specialist of **auxiliary aids and equipment**, which may assist these pupils in accessing the curriculum within a reasonable timeframe.
- Improve and maintain access to the **physical environment** of the school, adding specialist facilities as necessary – this covers improvements to the physical environment of the school and physical aids to access education within a reasonable timeframe.
- Improve the delivery of **written information** to pupils, staff, parents and visitors with disabilities; examples might included hand-outs, timetables, textbooks and information about the school and school events. The information should be made available in various preferred within a reasonable timeframe.

5. The Dene House Primary School Accessibility Plan relates to the key aspects of physical environment, curriculum and written information
6. Whole school training will recognise the need to continue raising awareness for staff and governors on equality issues with reference to the Equality Act 2010
7. The Accessibility Plan should be read in conjunction with the following school policies, strategies and documents:

8. The Accessibility Plan for physical accessibility relates to the Access Audit of the School, which remains the responsibility of the governing body. IT may not be feasible to undertake all of the works during the life of this accessibility plan and, therefore, some items will roll forward into subsequent plans. An accessibility audit will be completed by the school prior to the end of each period covering this plan in order to inform the development of a new Accessibility Plan for the ongoing period.

9. Equality Impact Assessments will be undertaken as and when school policies are reviewed. The terms of reference for all governors' committees will include the need to consider Equality and Diversity issues as required by the Equality Act 2010.
10. The Accessibility Plan will be published on the school website.
11. The Accessibility Plan will be monitored through the work of the governing body.
12. The school will work in partnership with the Trust, and where necessary the Local Authority, in developing and implementing this Accessibility Plan.
13. The Accessibility Plan may be monitored by Ofsted during inspection processes in relation to Schedule 10 of the Equality Act 2010.

2. Aims and Objectives

Our aims, as set out in this Accessibility Plan, are as follows:

- To increase access to the curriculum for pupils with a disability
- To improve and maintain access to the physical environment
- To improve the delivery of written information to pupils and their families

Our objectives are detailed in the action plan as presented below

3. Current good practice

Early Communication: We aim to enquire about any disability or health condition through careful early communication with new parents and carers. For parents and carers of children already at the school, a Health Needs Audit is carried out on an annual basis to monitor any changes in need.

Physical Environment: All pupils take part in extra-curricular activities with additional support provided where required. Some aspects of extra-curricular activities present particular challenges. For example, lunch and break times can be challenging for children with social/interaction impairments, some after-school clubs may present challenges to pupils with physical impairments, school trips may need additional considerations for pupils with medical needs. Each case is considered individually, allowing reasonable adjustments to be made and ensure access for all.

Dene House Primary School is a **single-storey building**, meaning all areas of the school are accessible to wheelchair users. Corridors are wide, and all classrooms and shared areas are on one level, ensuring smooth and easy movement throughout the building.

To support pupils with **mobility needs**, the school has:

- A **ceiling track hoist** to assist with transfers in designated areas.
- A **mobile hoist** available for flexibility of use across the school.
- A **fully accessible disabled toilet** with appropriate handrails and accessibility frames in other toilet areas.

- **Wide doorways** and **step-free access** through the main entrance.

All pupils are included in extracurricular activities, school trips, and clubs. Reasonable adjustments are made to ensure accessibility for all children, including those who use wheelchairs or require additional mobility support.

Visual Impairments / Nystagmus

Dene House Primary School is inclusive of children with **visual impairments** or **nystagmus**, ensuring that they can fully access the school environment and curriculum.

We provide:

- Adapted learning materials, such as **large print, high-contrast worksheets, or digitally enlarged resources**.
- Use of **screen magnification software** or **interactive technology** where required.
- Seating arrangements that support the child's visual needs, ensuring minimal glare and optimal visibility of teaching materials.
- Close liaison with the **Local Authority Sensory Support Service** for specialist advice and training for staff.
- Staff awareness and understanding of the impact of visual fatigue, ensuring regular movement breaks and rest opportunities.

Curriculum: There are areas of the curriculum which disabled pupils may have limited or no access. Some areas of the curriculum present particular challenges, for example: PE for pupils with a physical impairment, key curriculum areas for pupils with a visual or hearing impairment. Each case is considered individually to enable reasonable adjustments to be made to allow us to provide a broad, balanced and high-quality curriculum for all regardless of need.

Information: Different forms of communication are made available to enable access for all. Where families need additional support in accessing communications, particularly written communications, they are encouraged to seek this support within school where we are happy to make suitable arrangements.

4. Access Audit

The school is a single-storey building with corridors and several access points from outside. All internal areas of the school are ground level. The main entrance is wheelchair accessible and all entrances have wide doors fitted. Remaining entrances are all stepped entrances. The school is a single-storey building with no internal steps or stairs. All internal areas are level and accessible to wheelchair users.

- **Entrances and corridors:** Wide doors fitted throughout. The main entrance is wheelchair accessible and opens directly from the car park.

- **Hoists:** Both a ceiling track hoist and a mobile hoist are available to support pupils with physical disabilities.
- **Toilets:** One fully accessible disabled toilet and additional support rails
- **Signage:** Clear and well-positioned, with visual contrast to support those with visual impairments.

Emergency exits: Clearly marked and accessible to all users

The school has on-site parking for visitors and staff, the main entrance opens onto this car park. The main entrance is accessed by a buzzer system.

There are no internal steps or stairs within the school and wide doors are fitted to all rooms,

5. Management, coordination and implementation

- We will consult with experts when new situations regarding pupils with disabilities are experienced. These consultations will be carried out in a prompt and timely manner.
- The Governors and Senior Leadership Team will work closely with the Local Authority and The Tudhoe Learning Trust.

6. Action Plan

Aim 1

To increase the extent to which disabled pupils can participate in the school curriculum.

Our key objective is to reduce and eliminate barriers to access to the curriculum and to ensure full participation in the school community for pupils, and prospective pupils, with a disability.
