Procedural Knowledge


- Sort toys between **old** and **new**. Identify **similarities** and **differences** between them.
- Look at your own toys, your parents/carers' toys and your grandparents toys — identify similarities and differences. Put them in order from oldest to newest.
- Discuss how the materials from which toys are made from has changed and why they have changed.
- Discuss which toys your grandparents have played with that you still play with today.
- Use words and phrases such as old, new, before (I was born),
 after (I was born), past, present, then, now and a long time ago.

What will I find out by the end of the unit?

- My grandparents toys were usually made from wood and metal
- Some toys have been used across generations, such as dolls, scooters, teddy bears etc. Some toys are the same but might look different.
- There are many similarities and differences between old and new toys — this can be down to how they move and what they are made from.
- Lego has changed over time, moving from a few simple bricks to custom sets with lots of different pieces.
