<u>Self-Regulation</u>

- Show an understanding of their own feelings and those of others and begin to regulate their behaviour accordingly. - Set and work towards simple goals, being able to wait for what they want and control their immediate impulses when appropriate. - Give focused attention to what the teacher says, responding appropriately even when engaged in activity, and show an ability to follow instructions involving several ideas or actions.

Managing Self

- Be confident to try new activities and show independence, resilience and perseverance in the face of challenge. - Explain the reasons for rules, know right from wrong and try to behave accordingly. - Manage their own basic hygiene and personal needs, including dressing, going to the toilet and understanding the importance of healthy food choices.

Building Relationships

- Work and play cooperatively and take turns with others. - Form positive attachments to adults and friendships with peers. - Show sensitivity to their own and other needs.

Gross Motor Skills

- Negotiate space and obstacles safely, with consideration for themselves and others.
- Demonstrate strength, balance and coordination when playing.
- Move energetically, such as running, jumping, dancing, hopping, skipping and climbing. Fine Motor Skills

Physical Development

- Hold a pencil effectively in preparation for fluent writing — using the tripod grip in almost all cases. - Use a range of small tools, including scissors, paint brushes and cutlery. - Begin to show accuracy and care when drawing.

Expressive Arts and Design

<u>Creating with materials</u>

- Safely use and explore a variety of materials, tools and techniques, experimenting with colour, design, texture, form and function. Make use of props and materials when role playing characters in narratives and stories.
- Painting explore changes in artists' styles over the last century. Focus Artists: Kandinsky and Pollock (abstract and expressionism).

Being Imaginative and Expressive

- Invent, adapt and recount narratives and stories with peers and their teacher.
- Sing a range of well-known nursery rhymes and songs; Perform songs, rhymes, poems and stories with others, and when appropriate try to move in time with music.

Communication and Language

Listening and Attention

- Listen attentively and respond to what they hear with relevant questions, comments and actions when being read to and during whole class discussions and small group interactions.
- Make comments about what they have heard and ask questions to clarify their understanding.
- Hold conversation when engaged in back-and-forth exchanges with their teacher and peers.

Speaking

- Participate in small group, class and one-to-one discussions, offering their own ideas, using recently introduced vocabulary.
- Offer explanations for why things might happen, making use of recently introduced vocabulary from stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems when appropriate.
 - Express their ideas and feelings about their experiences using full sentences, including use of past, present and future.

Understanding the World

- Finding out about everyday materials.
- Exploring the natural world in our environment with all our senses (plants, wildlife, seasonal change, the weather).
- Learning about the different types of weather in our immediate environment and exploring hot and cold areas of the world
- Exploring the past and present: understanding similarities, differences and change by comparing toys of today with toys of the past.
- Finding out about Remembrance Day.
- Using & developing skills with everyday technology.



RE

Creation and Covenant: Exploring the Creation story and the Christian belief that everything that is, comes from a loving God. Learning about prayer (which brings us closer to God) and how we can care for our world (a gift from God).

Prophecy and Promise: Learning about the Nativity story and Advent. Multi-faith week: Buddhism



Comprehension

- Show understanding of what has been read by retelling stories and narratives using their own words and recently introduced vocabulary.
- Anticipate where appropriate key events in stories.
- Use and understand recently introduced vocabulary during discussions about stories, non-fiction, rhymes and poems and during role-play.

Word Reading

- Say a sound for each letter in the alphabet and at least 10 digraphs; Read words consistent with their phonic knowledge by sound-blending.
- Read aloud simple sentences and books that are consistent with their phonic knowledge, including some common exception words.

Writing

- Write recognisable letters, most of which are correctly formed; Spell words by identifying sounds in them and representing the sounds with a letter or letters.
- Write simple phrases and sentences that can be read by others.

We will be sharing lots of storybooks, non-fiction books activities and many linked to our topic...

Mathematics

Number

- Develop a deep understanding of number to 10, including the composition of each number.
- . Subitise (recognising quantities without counting) up to 6
- Automatically recall (without reference to rhymes, counting or other aids) number bonds up to 5 (including subtraction facts) and some number bonds to 10, including double facts.

Numerical Patterns

- Verbally count beyond 20, recognising the pattern of the counting system.
- Compare quantities up to 10 in different contexts, recognising when one quantity is greater than, less than or the same as the other quantity.
- Explore and representing patterns within numbers up to 10, including evens and odds, double facts and how quantities can be distributed equally.
- Éxplore 2D & 3D shape; repeating patterns; comparing length, weight and capacity; time & money.
