Technical lessons


- Different sentence types and structures will be taught on a Monday using Alan Pete.

- Spelling shed can be used to support at home and practising year 5/6 words.


Pathways to write

- Write away at the end of the unit for children to demonstrate and apply the skills that they have been taught.




Reading

Mental arithmetic

- There is a big focus on mental arithmetic in year 6.
- We will be having "times tables Thursday" to make sure that the children know their times tables.
- Everyday our maths lesson will start with "Fast 10" 10 arithmetic questions that will get progressively harder throughout the year.
- Everyday we will complete "flash back 4's" four questions designed to re-cap on different areas of maths that the children have already covered.

White Rose Hub

- We use White Rose Hub to teach maths.
- The children will be taught methods/skills and will then have the

opportunity to practise and apply what they have been taught.

 When they are confident with the fluency they will then have a go

at reasoning and problem solving.










- We have high expectations of the children now that they are in year 6.








Amber: 1 non verbal and 2 verbal warnings received by any school adult.











We will be monitoring each child's behaviour choices.

- Children will earn house points for their house for various activities such as behaviour, demonstrating our Christian values, intra school sports and other house activities throughout the year.
- There will be house captains chosen from year 6.
- There will be assemblies and opportunities for them to meet with their house.
- The points will be added together and announced to children.
- There will be trophies for the houses to win at the end of the year.



- Children will be assessed regularly throughout the year to track progress and plan teaching and interventions.
- We will use a mixture of past SAT papers and teacher assessment.
- Later in the year, some children may be offered booster sessions if needed - not always because they're not where they should be.
- Children will take their KS2 SATs on the week commencing 13th May 2024.
- They will do: a reading paper, a SPaG paper, an arithmetic paper, reasoning paper 2 and reasoning paper 3.
- We will do a parents meeting specifically about SATs closer to the time.

TAKING CHILDREN ON HOLIDAY DURING TERM TIME A guide for parents and carers

Frequently asked questions

Am I entitled to take my child out of school for a family holiday?

- No. Parents have a legal duty to ensure that their children attend school or the alternative provision on a regular basis
- The Education Act 1996 makes it a criminal offence for a parent to "fail to secure their child's regular attendance at the school"
- The amendments to the 2006 Regulations remove any reference to family holidays, extended leave and the statutory threshold of ten school days.
- The amendements make clear that Head Teachers may not grant any leave of absence (holiday) during term time unless there are exceptional circumstances
- The amendments give parents no entitlement to take their child out of school for a holiday in term time
- The Head Teacher and Governing Body will determine what the exceptional circumstances are

If we decide to take a holiday during term time what should we do?

- The parent/carer with whom the child resides must apply in writing to the school
- The letter/application must explain the exceptional circumstance surrounding the request for the leave of absence

What will the school do then?

- The Head Teacher will determine whether the exceptional circumstance ruling applies, if not the application will be declined
 - Only the Headteacher (or the Deputy) has the power to approve leave of absence applications. When making the decision the protocols and criteria laid down in the school's attendance policy must be followed.
 - Each academic year, schools inform parents/carers via a letter, newsletter or some other communication; that they may receive a Fixed Penalty Notice if their child has unauthorised absences in term time
- You will receive a written response from the Headteacher (or the Deputy) letting you know if your application has been approved
- If the holiday goes ahead after the application has been declined the absence will be recorded as unauthorised

What will happen if the absence is unauthorised?

- The school will decide if a Fixed Penalty Notice should be issued. If the school decide that a Fixed Penalty Notice is to be issued you will receive a letter from the school advising that it has referred the matter to the Local Authority and that a Fixed Penalty Notice will be issued;
- The school will inform the Local Authority that a Fixed Penalty Notice needs to be issued
- A Fixed Penalty Notice will be sent to you, accompanied by an explanatory letter; the Notice gives you the opportunity to pay a penalty fine instead of being prosecuted in the criminal courts

Payments will **not** be accepted after the 28th day and payments **cannot** be paid in part or by instalments

4. Use of mobile phones by pupils

We recognise that a mobile phone can help to support independence and safeguard children when travelling to and from school. We operate a "gate to gate" policy. On arrival to school (when entering the gate) phones should be switched off (not on silent). All phones should be handed in to the class teacher and stored away securely (they must not be accessed at anytime during the school day) Phones can be collected for the class teacher at the end of the school day. They MUST NOT be switched on until pupils reach the school gates.

4.1 Sanctions

> Should pupils breach the acceptable use of the mobile phone then parents / carers will be contacted. The mobile phone will be stored in head teacher's office and will need to be collected by an appropriate adult.




